Shocking Suicide.
A special despatch from Piquash, N. S., dated April 30, to the Halifax Herald, reports: One of the most determined cases of suicide occurred here this morning at five o'clock that has ever come under our notice. Philip Jones, of Doherty Creek, a most respected farmer, went to his barn at the hour named and struck himself with a hatchet on the head several times. He then deliberately cut his throat with a pen-knife, slashing his body with the same instrument. Finding that life was not leaving him he then threw a rope over the beam in the barn and hanged himself. He was found quite dead about half an hour afterwards. He leaves a wife and two daughters, who have the heartfelt sympathy of the whole community.
Crowfoot.
Crowfoot, the Blackfoot chief, whose death is announced, was a man of far more than ordinary ability. Those who have met and spoken with him refer to him in terms of high admiration, both for his personal character and intellectual strength. He won the foremost position among his own people, and had fortune cast his lot in a more civilized line of life, there is every reason to think he would have risen to high places. His goodwill toward the country in good stead during the Riel rebellion, when there was danger of his nation joining in the general attack against the whites that had been planned. His last advice, that his people should follow the example of the white man and depend on working their lands for a living, is another proof of his far-sighted wisdom.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, May 1.
After hearing Sir John Thompson's explanation of the Senate amendments to the bill respecting bills of exchange, cheques, and promissory notes, and giving the second reading to the bill from the Senate removing the five year limitation from mortgages made by companies, and also to the bill respecting the inspection of gas, the House spent the rest of the afternoon in concurrence on the report from the Committee of Supply.
After recess, concurrence was continued until 9 p. m., when all the items which have passed the committee had been concurred. The House then went into committee on the Banking Bill, a great deal of discussion taking place on the wording of several clauses. The House adjourned at 1.15.

News from Halifax.

HALIFAX, May 1.
Rev. Robert Laing has resigned the pastorate of St. Matthew's Church, and will give his whole time to the Ladies' College.
After hearing the delegates from Newfoundland in regard to French aggressions in that colony, the Halifax Board of Trade expressed their warmest sympathy with the people of Newfoundland in the effort they are now making to assert their constitutional rights.

Eight Hour Labor Agitation.

CHICAGO, May 1.
May day was opened by organized labor agitation for the eight hour work system, and passed without a serious disturbance. From 24,000 to 30,000 laborers marched in the great parade. Thousands viewed the procession. It was an orderly, good natured crowd, and an orderly parade.

London Workmen's Procession.

LONDON, May 1.
The procession of workmen to-day fell far short of the number expected, and the line was composed of only a few hundred men. The procession marched to Hyde Park, where a number of speeches in favor of the workmen's cause were delivered.

Carpenters on Strike.

PHILADELPHIA, May 1.
The journeymen carpenters of this city went on strike this morning. It is roughly estimated that 30,000 are out. No troubles are anticipated. Master carpenters employing 200 hands, after holding out until noon, conceded the demands of the men.

To Be Removed.

BOSTON, May 1.
The lighthouse board issues a notice that on the 5th of May the first class buoy, No. 9 Upper Middle Mainship Channel, Boston Harbor, will be permanently removed, leaving a lighted gas buoy to mark the position.

Five Students Suspended.

MONTREAL May 1.
The trouble in the Toronto College of Pharmacy over the discovery of the attempt of several students to steal copies of the examination papers, has been set at rest by the suspension of five students.

The Land Purchase Bill.

LONDON, May 1.
In the House of Commons this evening, the Land Purchase Bill passed its second reading, 348 to 268.
