

World's Top Ghost-Hunters Meet This Week In England

CAMBRIDGE, Eng. (Reuters)—Some of the world's leading ghost-hunters are meeting here this week to set up international rules for tracking down spooks.

Twenty-nine members of the Society for Psychical Research have gathered here to tell ghost stories but rather to analyze and assess them by scientific means.

Their six-day conference is being held in secret and newspapers have found that they do not have a ghost of a chance of gaining admittance to the hall of Newnham College, where the delirious are taking place.

Will produce evidence

But one delegate, Prof. Hornell Hart, well-known ghostologist at Durham University, N.C., said he will place before the meeting evidence that it is possible for the human spirit to leave the body during sleep and travel to distant places.

Hart, who is highly critical of ghost stories until he has investigated them, believes the existence of apparitions proves that something of the human spirit continues after death.

Damages Case Begins In Court At Georgetown

The case of Edward Laybolt, Bristol, plaintiff, and Johnston Motors, Murray River, defendant, for damages was heard before Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy and civil jury at the regular July sitting of the Supreme Court at Georgetown yesterday. Witnesses for the plaintiff included Mr. Laybolt, Lorne Dolron, Mount Stewart, and Anthony Trainor, Bristol. Mr. J. A. MacDonald, Q.C., is representing the plaintiff. Three witnesses were heard for the defendant: Mr. Don MacGregor, Mr. Glen MacKinnon and Mr. E. K. Johnston. The defendant is represented by Mr. J. O. C. Campbell, Q.C., and Mr. J. P. Nicholson.

The case was not concluded yesterday afternoon, and the cross examination of Mr. Johnston will commence this morning at 9:30 a.m. Standard Time.

The members of the civil jury are: foreman, Wilfred Campbell, Annandale; Borden Mooney, Peakes Station; William MacMillan, St. Peter's; Foster Garret, East Baltic; George Martin, New Perth; Frank Wood Souris; Anthony Judson, St. Peter's. Twenty-six were summoned from whom two were excused, one out of the province and two over age.

The counsel for the plaintiff and the counsel for the defendant each had four challenges while picking the jury.

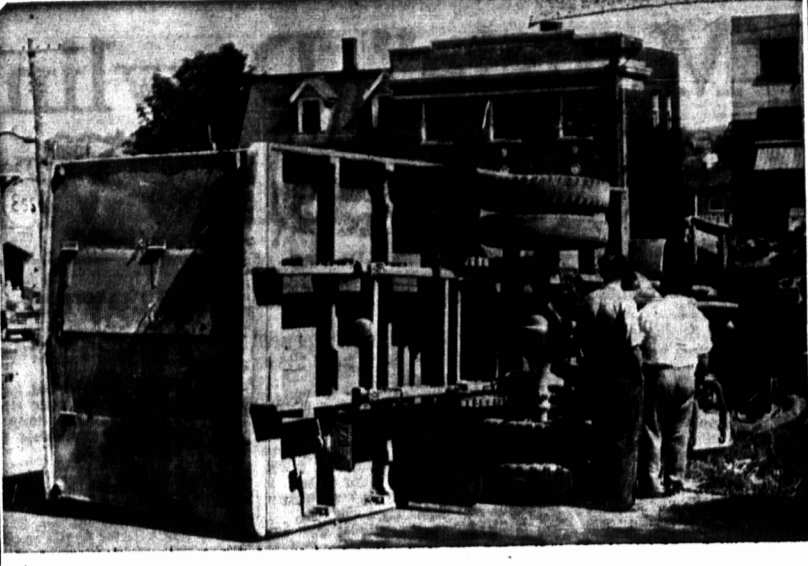

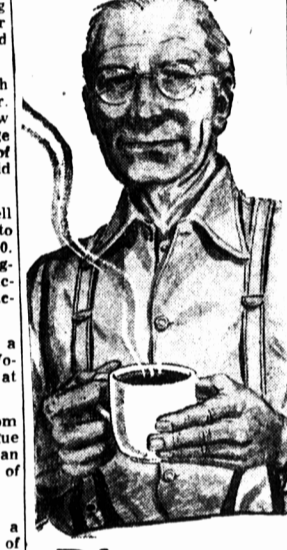
