A SAD DEATH.—We regret to hear that a man named Michael McCarvell, residing on Sydney Street, near the Methodist church, met with a sudden death yesterday afternoon about five o'clock. It appears that Mr. McCarvell was removing his pigs from one yard to another, when he slipped and fell on the ice, breaking his spine and dying almost instantly. Mr. McCarvell was between sixty and seventy years of age.

TEMPERANCE MEETING.—The temperance meeting in St. Paul's Schoolroom last evening was well attended. Mayor Hayland presided. Addresses were made by Rev. Messrs. Hamlyn and Sutherland, and there were also recitations, duets, etc. The following resolution was adopted: "Resolved, That this meeting, realizing the tremendous amount of evil caused by the drink traffic throughout the Dominion, desires to express its hearty approval of the introduction of a Prohibitory Law at the earliest possible moment." After the meeting a number remained to form a temperance organization in connection with the church.

RECORD BROKEN.—Some weeks ago Mr. J. J. Meadams' fine mare, Nancy, hauled from West St. Peter's to the Morell starch factory a load of potatoes, which tipped the scales at 3650 lbs. This was the heaviest load ever hauled to said factory, thus creating a standing record. Mr. John D. Sinnott, of Morell, conscious of the strength possessed by his fine horse, Major, determined that Nancy no longer should wear the laurel, and on the 7th inst., hauled from Morell to Lot 40 Station, two loads of oats, which respectively tipped the scales at 2457 lbs., and 4061 lbs. We congratulate Mr. Sinnott and his plucky horse, and advise West St. Peter's to look to its laurels.—Cox.

OPPOSITION RALLY.—The Opposition rally in the Lyceum last evening was largely attended and great enthusiasm was manifested. Addresses were made by the candidates for the city, Messrs. Owen and Fitzgerald, and by Senator Howland, M. P. Hogan, Geo. Peake, and John T. Mellish, Esq. The meeting was adjourned about half-past nine, and Messrs. Owen and Fitzgerald at once repaired to the Market Hall where the Government meeting was in progress. When they entered the hall the large number of Conservatives present cheered lustily, and upon their coming forward to speak the cheers were loud and long. Mr. Fitzgerald's arraignment of the Government's policy was very forcible and pointed, and his address made an excellent impression.

ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL ISLANDER.—The Daily Humboldt Times, published at Eureka, Cal., has the following: "Word was received here yesterday that Otto C. Gregor, had successfully passed an examination before the Supreme Court, which allows him now to practice in any court in the State. Mr. Gregor is a Humboldt boy and studied law in the office of Hon. Frank McGowan in this city, and with his preceptor enjoys the proud distinction of being one of the two Humboldt lawyers who have been admitted to the bar directly from the Supreme Court of the State." The Mr. Gregor referred to above is a son of the late Angus Gregor, Esq., of New Glasgow, and left the Island some seven or eight years ago. We most heartily congratulate him upon his success in the land of his adoption.

ALBERTON NEWS.—The Alberton correspondent of the Guardian says: "Mr. R. Oulton, of Savage Island, and a son of William Skerry had a very narrow escape from drowning the other day. In crossing from the Island to the wharf side the dory tilted. Mr. Oulton clung to the boat and the boy hung on to a barrel that was in the boat. Capt. Wm. Larkin and the men of the schooner, seeing their peril, immediately launched a boat of the schooner and got to them just in time, as they were almost gone, and only that they called to the little fellow, who was hanging on the chains of the barrel, to keep up his courage, he would have been gone."

A Gloom has been cast over the place by the sudden death of Miss Eliza Weeks, sister of John T. Weeks, Esq., who died yesterday from blood poisoning, caused by a slight cut in her finger some five days previous.

LITERARY NOTES.

With the December number of McClure's Magazine is begun its second volume, and by the character of its contents renews the promise, so amply kept in the first volume, of being a magazine, not to buy and lay by for a day of future reference that never comes, but to buy and read—read at once, read without stopping. An account by Mr. Arthur Warren of a visit to Aroldeacon Farrar, embracing much interesting talk by the Archdeacon on his acquaintance with Tennyson and other eminent men, on his work, and on Westminster Abbey, and richly illustrated, opens the number. Professor Henry Drummond relates the history of the founding and progress of the Boy's Brigade, an organization which is making a new earth for the street arab and other untended and half-tended boys. The article of sharpest present interest, perhaps, is a discriminating and sympathetic study of the character and career of Governor William McKinley, by E. Jay Edwards. Charles A. Dana, the distinguished editor of the New York Sun, provides a particularly interesting travel sketch in some notes on a journey lately made to Jerusalem. Nearly every article is copiously illustrated, but of special value are a group of portraits of Tennyson and his friends—among them, Sir John Herschel, Brownrigg, Charles Darwin, and Carlyle—reproduced from the famous negatives of Mrs. Julia Margaret Cameron. The last of the Sturtevant Holmes stories by Conno Doyle, an Arkian as Curran story by Octave Thanet, and a new story of the seen and unseen by Mr. Oliphant, give special distinction to the fiction of the number. In the novel department of "Human Dainties" of certain are given of the Honorable Whitelaw Reid, William T. Stead, and Governor W. B. McKinley, from boyhood to the present time.

"Anthony Kent" is the title of a story by Charles Stokes Wayne, which is published complete in the December number of "Tales From Tompkins." It is a highly interesting story of a strange love-episode in the life of a young American in Europe, who, by becoming entangled with a girl, brings endless misery upon himself. The descriptive scenes of Venice, of the Carlo, and Paris are exceptionally graphic, and as the characters are well drawn and the action of the story is very brisk, this new novel is one that cannot fail to hold attention to the end.
