

# Belleville MacFarlands Leave For World Tourney

TORONTO (CP)—Lou Smrke, Yugoslav-born right-winger with Belleville MacFarlands, was refused clearance by United States immigration authorities here Sunday as the team left by plane for New York on the first leg of its trip to the world amateur hockey tournament in Czechoslovakia. Smrke was transferred to another plane that took him to Montreal and then on to London and Prestwick, Scotland.

U.S. authorities at Malton Airport had no comment to make on the action and Smrke, born in Belgrade and resident of Canada for most of his 32 years, told reporters he didn't want "anyone to make a fuss about this." Smrke said the Royal Canadian Mounted Police "have a file on me" and refused further comment.

Immediately it was known the team would depart for Prague.

U.S. team officials made other arrangements. He will join the team in Glasgow Monday morning and team officials said he would play at Paisley, Scotland, Monday night in the team's first exhibition game before the March 5-15 championship.

**SENDOFF AT AIRPORT**

More than 200 fans from Belleville thronged Malton airport to give the 1958 Allan Cup champions a sendoff. Nineteen players, including newly-signed Pete Conacher, son of famous Charlie Conacher, one-time great with Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League, were on the Trans-Canada Air Lines plane when it took off for New York shortly before 11 a.m. EST.

Conacher, 28-year-old left-winger who refused to report to Buffalo of the American Hockey League this season, was waived out of the AHL Friday night and signed with Belleville a few hours later.

# Hawks, Habs Tie 3-All; Rangers, Bruins Cop Wins

CHICAGO (AP)—Abie McDonald's goal with less than five minutes left in the game enabled the National Hockey League-leading Montreal Canadiens to tie Chicago Black Hawks 3-3 at the stadium here Sunday night. Moments before McDonald's marker, Chicago's Ed Litzenberger put the Hawks in front with his second goal of the game and 24th of the season.

The tie left the Canadiens 14 points ahead of Chicago and the New York Rangers, in second place tie by virtue of the Rangers' victory over Toronto Saturday night.

The 3-3 deadlock was a repeat of the tie the Hawks and Canadiens played in Montreal Saturday night.

Chicago owned a 2-0 lead on a first-period marker by Litzenberger and a tally by Ron Murphy early in the second frame when Montreal's Don Marshall tallied at 16:25 of the middle period.

Dick Moore knocked Murphy's shot into his own cage but atoned for this by scoring at the 4:43 mark of the final frame to tie the score.

NEW YORK (AP)—A four-goal attack in the first period paved the way for a 5-4 New York Rangers victory over Detroit Red Wings Sunday night in their National Hockey League game at Madison Square Garden. The win raised the Rangers' margin to six points over fifth-place Detroit in the five-way fight for three playoff spots.

Andy Bathgate, the league's leading goal-scorer, netted his 28th goal on a power play to give the Rangers a lead they never relinquished at 7:30 of the opening period.

Red Sullivan, who paced the New York attack with two goals, scored less than a minute later and there was no catching the Rangers.

Gordie Howe for Detroit and Andy Hebenton and Larry Popein for the Rangers made it 4-1 before Louie Fontinato and Howe got into a slugging match behind the Red Wing cage. Both drew major penalties. Fontinato also suffered a possible fractured nose.

The Bruins had built up a first period lead of 4-1 on two goals by Gendron and singles by Bron Horvath and Johnny Bucy. Gerry Ehman scored for the Leafs. The Bruin's lead melted to 4-3 by the end of the second period. Ehman scored again and Billy Harris once for Toronto.

**GASHES TOPPAZZINI**

At 4:12 of the finale, Mahovich whacked Boston's Jerry Toppazzini across the forehead with his stick after chasing him down the ice. A five-minute major was automatic for drawing blood from Mahovich's left eye that required seven stitches.

# Renowned Billiard Great, Willie Hoppe, Dies At 71

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Willie Hoppe, 71, one of the all-time greats of billiards and world champion for more than 20 years before his retirement, died Sunday after a long illness.

Hoppe had suffered from cancer for many months. He was in the St. Francis Hospital at Miami Beach for the last four months.

William Frederick Hoppe was his full name, but he was known as "Willie" from the day he mounted a wooden box to reach the table in the rear of his father's barber shop at Cornwall-on-the-Hudson, N.Y., to show the town boys how to control the ivory ball. He gave his last exhibition two years ago in Chicago.

He was quiet, unassuming and always immaculate in dress. He began his career by touring dirty, smoke-filled pool rooms of by-gone days, but so dignified the game that he drew Metropolitan Opera Stars, members of society, kings and princes to see him weave a spell with a cue. He probably was the only billiard player ever to give an exhibition in the White House. He played before President Taft in 1911.

**BALKLINE CHAMPION**

Willie reached the heights in balkline competition before the First World War, declined some what during the 1920s and then came back as the greatest three-cushion player in the world.

He was crowned 18.1 balkline champion in 1906 at the age of 18, ruled the 18.2 world from 1910-1920, won the title again in 1923-24, was unchallenged as 18.1 king from 1914 and tried the 18.1 king played and difficult 71.2 successfully in 1938.

As the exacting game of balkline took its toll of top-notch players, Hoppe turned to three-cushion.

**SENSATIONAL WIN**

Although always a threat, he was unable to win the world title until 1940 when he beat 20 straight victories—still believed to be a record of tournament play.

A year later, he collapsed while playing a challenge match with young Jake Schaefer, but a month later rebounded from a case of pneumonia and retained his title with the loss of only one game out of 18. The 1942 round-robin championship, saw him come through again, winning eight out of nine contests.

## Aragon's Purse Held Up Again

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. (AP)—Boxer Art Aragon, California "golden boy" who seeks a hot at Don Jordan's welterweight title, knocked out Charlie Sawyer in the fourth round Saturday night but both fighters' purses were held up.

Two years ago Aragon was charged with offering a \$500 bribe to another boxer to take a dive in a Texas fight that never came off.

Referee Tommy Hart tolled the count Saturday night amid some of the loudest boing ever heard at Hollywood's Legion Stadium. Clayton Frye, inspector for the State Athletic Commission, conferred with Hart and decided to hold up the purses.

## Sets New World High Jump Mark

NEW YORK (AP)—John Thomas, the 17-year-old Boston University freshman, became the first man in history to high-jump seven feet 11 inches when he cleared the height in the Millrose Games Saturday night.

Only two weeks ago, the gangling lad set a world mark of 6 feet 11 1/2 inches in Boston.

While a throng of more than 15,000 watched in Madison Square Garden Saturday, Thomas and Charlie Dumas, the first outdoor seven-footer, engaged in a tense duel.

Up and up they went and one by one the opposition melted under the pace. Finally both cleared 6-0.

**SEVEN FEET**

The bar went up to seven feet.

Thomas was first off the mark. He missed. Then it was Dumas' turn. He missed, too.

Thomas made it on the second try. The crowd let out a tremendous roar. Dumas was one of the first to race to the youngster to wring his hand. The outdoor record is 7-1, held by Yuri Stapanov, the Russian who cleared the height with a built-up shoe. The record was accepted, but the shoe later was outlaid by international authorities.

Ron Delany jogged to his 26th straight mile victory when he won the Wanamaker Mile in 4:06.5.

To all persons who engage contractors to undertake any work within the Scope of the Workmen's Compensation Act—

Your particular attention is called to the requirements outlined in Section 66, Sub-section (4) of the above Act which reads as follows:—

"(4) Where any work within the scope of this Part is undertaken by a contractor, the person for whom such work is undertaken shall, within seven days after the making of any such contract notify the Board in writing of the making of such contract and in such notice shall state:

(a) The name and address of the contractor;

(b) The nature of the work to be performed by the contractor;

(c) The amount payable under the contract, whether a lump sum or in proportion to the amount of work done, and in the latter case give the full particulars;

(d) The probable length of time for completion of the work to be performed by the contractor."

Strict compliance with the above provisions is now called for by those responsible to furnish such information and failure to do so will result in imposition of the penalties provided for in Section 78 of the Act.
