GARRISON ARTILLERY.—The officer commanding the 4th Regt. C. A. has received a cheque from the Treasurer of the Dominion Artillery Association for \$80, being for prizes won by members of this Regt. last year at Quebec for short course efficiency certificates. Considering that there are only five prizes given each year for garrison certificates and that the 4th Regt. secured all five against the rest of the Dominion, we consider the work extremely creditable. The prize winners are as follows: Sergt. Hurdie McLean, No 2 Co., (now in South Africa) \$25; Gunner R. Donaldson, No 3 Co., \$20; Gunner C. O. McDonald, No 3 Co., \$15; Gunner G. Thistle, No 4 Co., \$12; Gunner E. Ledwill, No 3 Co., \$8.

SUPREME COURT.

Before the Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Fitzgerald.

Khabell Sharbell vs. Peter J. Solomon. The Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Fitzgerald gave judgment this morning ordering the defendant's immediate discharge from Prince County jail. It was an application for a writ of Habeas Corpus on behalf of the defendant who has been a prisoner in Prince County jail since March last. The facts and circumstances relating to the defendant's imprisonment are rather complicated, but it appears that defendant was arrested under a capias issued out of the County Court of Prince County for under \$32 and instead of being taken immediately before a Justice of the Peace nearest to the plaintiff and tried he was committed to jail and kept there for some days and then taken before Leonard Morris and Joseph Murphy, justices at Summerside, who tried the case and Morris issued an execution which detained defendant in jail. Neither Morris nor Murphy was the nearest justice to the plaintiff. There were a large number of legal questions argued yesterday when judgment was received until this morning. The Court held that defendant was illegally imprisoned from the first and ordered his discharge forthwith, that he should never have been imprisoned on the capias, that the magistrates at Summerside had no jurisdiction to try the case, that their proceedings were not only irregular but void and that the execution issued by Morris was also absolutely void. Morson, Q. C., for the plaintiff Sharbell; Stewart, Q. C., for the defendant Solomon.

Mr. James D. Hyndman was called to the bar on his petition and on motion of Mr. McLean, Q. C.

James Bradley vs. Henry B. Smith. Action of trespass tried last Hilary term before Mr. Justice Fitzgerald without a jury when judgment was reserved.

Mr. Justice Fitzgerald this morning gave judgment for the defendant.

Upon motion of Mr. Morson, Q. C., for the plaintiff the time for moving for a new trial was extended until next term.

The Court adjourned sine die.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—A lecture by Rev. Dr. Morrison, should attract a large audience especially as the subject (The Indians of America) is a most interesting one. The learned gentleman lectures before the Natural History and Antiquarian Society next Monday evening.

—Public confidence in our Government ferry steamers will not be restored until a thorough inspection of them has been made. We have a letter in which the writer states that the timbers and planks of "The Southport" "must be very rotten," as the vessel is nearly thirty years old, and "the timbers were partly rotten when she was planked." The Government ought to reassure the people by having an inspection.

—The Summerside Journal relates a disgraceful fact when it says: "The plebiscite was a great political humbug, and it was so intended by Sir Wilfrid and his colleagues, who have no intention whatever of passing a prohibitory law. They gave the temperance people of Canada to understand that they would give effect to the voice of the people, as recorded at the polls. The people have a decided majority in favor of prohibition, but the government going back on their promises have ignored and disregarded their own solemn pledges, and have betrayed and outraged the prohibitionists of the Dominion." The Guardian and some others are striving to induce temperance men to forgive those who so deceived them. But earnest temperance men, say "vote the deceivers down."
