American Millionaires

One of the greatest dangers which now menace the stability of American institutions is the growth of individual millionaires, and the consequent concentration of property and money in single hands. A recent article in a prominent paper of New York State gives figures which must serve to draw general attention to the evolution of this difficulty. The following are said to be the nine greatest fortunes in the United States—

Nearly all these men live in a comparatively simple style, and it is obviously impossible for them to spend more than a portion of their immense daily and yearly revenues. The surplus consequently becomes capital, and helps to build still higher the fortunes of these individuals. Mr. Howard Irving Smith, the writer of the article from which we quote, states that of the nine millionaires not one uses tobacco, and only three touch ardent spirits at all, and then very sparingly. W. K. Vanderbilt spends the most money. W. W. Astor has been interested in politics. Mr. Rockefeller and Cornelius Vanderbilt take part in church work. The others are more or less retiring in their nature and habits of life. Mr. Rockefeller began the fight for fortune as a book-keeper, Mr. Huntington by selling Yankee clocks, and Russell Sage as a grocer. But to the Vanderbilts great wealth came chiefly by accumulation and the judicious investment of the few millions originally gathered by the old Commodore. Now the family possesses the following immense sums—

It took just twenty years to combine this wealth in the hands of eight or nine men. Here, then, is the danger. In the hands of Gould, the Vanderbilts, and Huntington are the great railroads of the United States. In the possession of Sage, the Astors and others, rest great blocks of New York land, which are constantly increasing in value. United and by natural accumulation, the fortunes of these nine families would amount in twenty-five years to \$2,754,000,000. William Waldorf Astor himself will, by pure force of accumulation, be probably worth a thousand millions before he dies, and this money, like that of the Vanderbilts, will descend in his family as in others, and create an aristocracy of wealth infinitely dangerous to the commonwealth, and forming a curious commentary upon that aristocracy of birth or talent which Americans consider to be so injurious to Great Britain. And other great fortunes are in existence or rising, a few only of which are given:

Thus we see money and capital in almost inconceivable sums being vested in a few, and necessarily taken from the many. Good may be done with some of it, and it may, perhaps, be hard to say just how the difficulty can be remedied without undue interference with individual liberty and the common right to use the intellect given to man. But certainly it is absurd for the American press to dwell, as it so often does, upon the freedom of workingman from all undue influence and the equality and fraternity of its people as compared with England, where large amounts are alleged to be wrongfully resting in land inherited from a distant past, when in this boasted Republic we can find 34 men holding over \$1,300,000,000, and it may, perhaps, be hard to say just how the difficulty can be remedied without undue interference with individual liberty and the common right to use the intellect given to man. Another Long Session Probable.

Sir,—I see by your Ottawa correspondent that the present session of Parliament is likely to be lengthened out till Dominion Day. While grip obstruction is chiefly responsible for the undue length of the session, it seems to me that representatives of both parties have no very serious objection to staying at the capital—as it pays well to linger there. Last year was the second time within the last few years that five hundred dollars in addition to the recent seasonal allowance of one thousand dollars were voted for each member both of the House and the Senate. A "rind robin," signed by members of both sides of the House, asking for additional pay, had the desired effect. This giving extra pay acts as a premium upon obstruction and long-winded speeches, and the country need not be surprised if another five hundred specie results in another long session at Ottawa.

Canadian Banking.

A clever article on the "Advantages of the Canadian Bank System" appears in the May Forum, from the pen of Mr. D. R. Wilkie, General Manager of the Imperial Bank of Canada. In alluding to the benefits of the extension of business beyond the headquarters of monetary institutions, Mr. Wilkie points out that, but for this branch system, "the Canadian Northwest could not possibly in so short a period have reached its present state of development, and the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway could not have been so speedily completed." He goes on to say:

"The wholesale merchants of Winnipeg are paying us higher interest charges than the merchant princes of Montreal. The Northwest seller can borrow upon the security of his grain in store upon as favorable terms as the Ontario farmer. Compare the hardships endured by the Dakota settler if he have the misfortune to require a temporary loan, the one, two, or if not three per cent. per month that he is compelled to pay as interest if not discount, with the comfort enjoyed by his brother in Manitoba; who can, warehouse receipt in hand, approach his banker with ease and satisfaction, knowing that the needed amount may be obtained at a moderate rate of interest. Will not the banking facilities of the Canadian Northwest of themselves commend that district to the intending settler as preferable in other respects to equally attractive land to the south?"

Mr. Wilkie points out that Edmonton, nine hundred miles north-west of Winnipeg, has the same banking facilities as a suburb of Toronto; and that Nelson, in the very heart of the Rockies, is served by branches of two banks.

Mount Stewart Notes.

Trade in our village is beginning to get brisk and our fishermen are arranging for the summer work. At Point DeRoche and French Village several new factories have been erected of late and more are in contemplation.

Herring have struck in in plenty the past two days and are in good demand for lobster bait.
