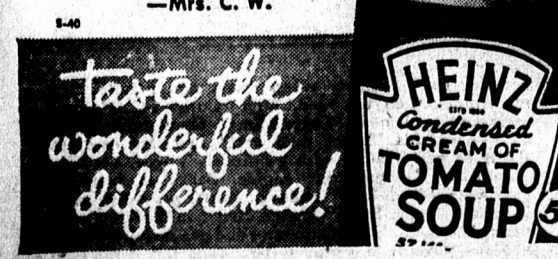

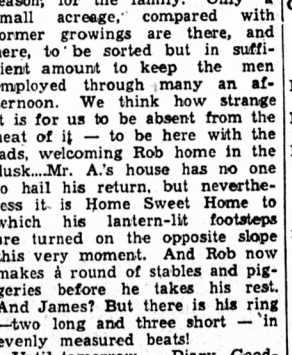
Montague Man On Exercise Sweetbriar
