## SITE OF PROPOSED HIGHLAND COLLEGE P.E.I. CULTURAL, TOURIST ATTRACTION

# Highland College And Inn Said Major Development

A major cultural development and tourist attraction is currently being organized in Prince Edward Island.

Plans call for the establishment of a Highland College and Cultural Centre to be operated in conjunction with a Scottish Inn at Georgetown.

A former resort hotel known as "The Highlands", owned by Rev. John Sutherland Bonnell, D.D. of New York City, is the locale chosen for this far-reaching venture which could attract additional tourists to the Island and open up the eastern part of the province to unprecedented tourist development.

The college would offer professional instruction in highland dancing, piping and drumming, Gaelic language, ballet and tap. Organized sport would also be included.

It would afford young people an opportunity to combine a music and dance education with a pleasant camp-type holiday.

Instructors would include James L. MacKenzie of Aberdeen, Scotland, world champion highland dancer and Seumas MacNeill, principal of the Glasgow College of Piping.

Accommodation would be available for tourists. Regular highland and variety concerts would be staged by the students affording tourists from all sections of the province a chance to enjoy Scottish entertainment.

Located on a good beach, The Highlands consists of a recent hotel, a dance pavilion, a small motel and a staff residence. A golf course and tennis court form part of the spacious lawn and grounds surrounding the buildings in a setting ideally suited for this sort of development.

Organization for the proposed centre has been underway for more than a year and already many prominent business and professional men, not only in Prince Edward Island but in other parts of Canada and the United States, have become interested in the project.

Scottish promotion he has assisted in the staging of Highland Games in Prince Edward Island and Ontario and has co-operated in arranging mainland concerts for the Gaelic College.

The proposed Highland College and Scottish Inn at Georgetown would be operated only during the summer months. Interested highland dancers and pipers from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick have already signified their intention of attending classes at the new college if it is established.

Bi-weekly highland and variety concerts and drama, both outdoors and indoors, would be staged. A three-day Highland Gathering would be held at the close of summer school.

Competitions would be open to non-students as well and qualified judges would officiate. Regional championships would be established and all contestants would be under the regulations of the Scottish Official Board of Highland Dancing and affiliation would also be made with the Glasgow College of Piping which would present diplomas.

There would be regular recitals for ballet and tap dance students. Each season would end with a graduation followed by a colorful Tartan Ball complete with the Grand March.

**OPEN NEXT YEAR**

The college could be in operation next summer if sufficient financial assistance is forthcoming. Shares are being sold to the general public at the moment and the response is encouraging.

In a recent letter to Mr. Fraser endorsing the idea, John Fisher, executive director of the Canadian Tourist Association said "I like the idea of a Highland College and Scottish Inn." The latest issue of the Canadian Tourist Association bulletin ranked it as "a major tourist attraction for the Maritime Provinces."
