

THE FISHERIES.

We believe that a larger portion of the Revenue of this Island is derived from duties paid upon articles imported for the fishing establishments in the country than many are disposed to admit; but we are aware that there are some who think that sufficient attention is not given to this branch of industry, and who watch legislative actions on the fisheries with a great deal of interest; all such will cordially approve of the action of the House of Commons at Ottawa, in levying a license duty of two dollars a ton upon American fishing vessels, which is to be expended in bounties to their own fishermen; an act which would have been worthy the adoption of our own Government and Legislature. Had the Dominion Government raised the duty to six dollars a ton, they would have been perfectly justified in doing so. The following resolutions were lately passed at a meeting of those engaged in the business in New England:—

Resolved, That a return to the former policy of the United States Government in fostering and protecting these fisheries is immediately demanded.

Resolved, That the existing tariff of fifty cents per one hundred pounds on codfish, and one dollar per one hundred pounds upon mackerel is an insufficient protection.

Resolved, That a large increase of duty upon foreign fish is indispensable to the continuance and maintenance of our fisheries.

Resolved, That the drawback upon foreign salt offered by Congress as a cost of the fishing bounties is adequate compensation therefor.

The Novascotian commenting upon these resolutions says:— "No more uncalculated and impudent demand for protection was ever made. The New Englanders are allowed the undeserved privilege of fishing on our coasts, and now they desire to drive us from their markets."

If New Englanders are unable to compete with us fairly in this branch of business, let them give it up. They are now sheltered behind duties almost prohibitory; they receive a drawback upon the salt they use, while we are forced to depend upon our own unaided efforts. What more can they reasonably desire?"

We feel that our contemporary is fully justified in what he says, and hope that this inexhaustible source of wealth in the waters around this Island may soon receive that attention from our Government, which its importance would justify them in bestowing upon it. From what we have read of the fisheries in different parts of Great Britain, we are led to believe that if the real value of the fisheries of Prince Edward Island were but known to experienced capitalists in Great Britain, who have their tens of thousands invested in the fishing business of that country, it would not be long before a company would be formed in London, to prosecute the business here, upon a scale hitherto unknown in this colony.

THE ENGLISH MAIL.

We have received English papers up to the date of the 25th April. The more important news has been nearly all anticipated by telegraph. The administrative powers of British Statesmen are taxed to the utmost with the question of Reform, Fenianism, Irish Church, and Colonial difficulties. The visit of the Prince and Princess of Wales to Ireland has been a decided success. The Irish people evinced their joy and enthusiasm on the event, by a succession of magnificent demonstrations. The Prince was installed as a knight of St. Patrick in the Dublin Cathedral, and had also the degree of L. L. D. conferred upon him by the Senate of Dublin University. Gladstone's resolutions for the abolition of the Irish Church Establishment, are causing quite a commotion in political circles. Meetings are being held throughout the Kingdom in support of the resolutions. Conspicuous among these meetings was one held at Mr. Spurgeon's Tabernacle, when Mr. John Bright, M. P. P., presided. The spacious building was crowded to excess, and hundreds were unable to gain admittance. Mr. Bright is represented as making a brilliant speech, and declared it was the duty of the majority of the House of Commons, backed by public opinion throughout the country, to put an end to the present Administration which admits that it has no policy. The Chancellor of the Exchequer made his annual financial statement on the 23rd. The revenue for the past year amounts to £71,859,000, and the expenditure, which includes arrears of income tax, £70,428,000. It was supposed that the whole cost of the Abyssinian expedition, if its objects were effected in May, would amount to about five millions pounds. The news from the continent is unimportant, except some stray rumors of war, and some misunderstanding between the Pope and the Emperor of Austria, occasioned by the annulling of the Concordat.

Very Latest Telegrams.

London, May 7. Mr. Whitehead, Member for Bedford, moved a resolution for the withdrawal of the grant of £30,000 to each of Roman Catholic Colleges, Maynooth, and to abolish Regium Donum and the grant of Presbyterians, after the disestablishment of the Irish Church, which was agreed to.

It is reported that the Princess Louisa, daughter of Queen Victoria, has been contracted in marriage to Christian Frederic, Prince Royal of Denmark. John Bright and other members of the Liberal party in England, have united in a petition to Hon. Gathorne Hardy for commutation of the punishment of the Fenian prisoner Barrett, who was recently convicted at the old Bailey for complicity in the Clerkenwell explosion. The petitioners urge the point that an alibi in the case of Barrett was conclusively proved.

Official despatches have been received at the Indian office from Gen. Napier dated Tanta Abyssinia, on the 21st of April, after the capture of Magdala, 30 guns and mortars were destroyed, and the town razed completely to the rock on which it stood. Gen. Napier reports that the Queen and her apparent to the throne are in camp. The army will reach the Red Sea coast during May, all the troops were well, and the army trains were up with the advance guard of returning forces.

London, May 10. Henry Lord Brougham, the eminent reformer and Chancellor of England, died at his residence at Canina yesterday in his 90th year. Geo. F. Train, who was imprisoned for debt, was brought before the Court of bankruptcy yesterday and admitted to bail.

London, May 11. A Sydney, Australia, letter of March 31 states that despatches had just been received from the Foreign Secretary in London ordering that the Anti-Fenian-Treason-Polony Act should be put in force in Sydney.

New York, May 11. A Washington despatch contains correspondence between Mr. Seward and Mr. Thornton, the British Minister, announcing the release of the so-called Fenian prisoners Nagle, Nugent, Lee, and Fitzgibbon.

Boston, May 11. The latest from Washington up to this hour (11.50 p.m.) is that the indications are strongly in favor of President Johnson's acquittal. There will not be two votes to spare on either side and the result is anxiously looked for, which will be delivered in Senate at 12.30 to-morrow.

New York, May 8. The House of Representatives spent the longer part of yesterday's session in debating a joint resolution requesting the President to send a fleet of war vessels to the Gulf of St. Lawrence for the purpose of protecting our fishermen from the excessive tax imposed by the Canadian authorities. The resolution was finally passed by a vote of 92 to 39.

A dispatch from Ottawa says that the new Patent Bill will only allow the citizens of Canada to take out patents. The Bill to reduce Governor General's salary from \$50,000 to \$42,000 was passed on the second reading in the House of Commons.

Ottawa, May 8. Licence to American vessels fishing in Canadian waters fixed at two dollars per ton, and system of three warnings dispensed with.

The remains of Mr. William Doull, eldest son of George Doull Esq., of Wilton Creek, were brought here in the steamer last evening. He died at Sackville, N. B., on Tuesday last, after a few days illness of inflammation of the lungs. The deceased was a very fine young man, and was highly esteemed and beloved by all who knew him. His early death will be a great cause of sorrow to his parents. No intelligence of the sad event had reached them until the body was brought home. But they mourn not as those who have no hope, for as he had lived the life of the righteous, he died the death of the righteous. We deeply sympathize with the bereaved family.

The Steamer Princess of Wales makes her trips to this port on Tuesday and Friday nights, arriving here about 12 o'clock, from Charlottetown; on her return from Shediac, on Wednesday and Saturday, she arrives here about 1 o'clock in the evening. There seems to be a great deal of dissatisfaction among the shippers and others, at the unreasonable hour at which the boat calls. We learn that the Company are trying to arrange to have the boat come at noon on Tuesday. We hope they may succeed.

Three Schooners with cargoes of hay arrived here during the past week. It sold readily at seven shillings per 100 lbs. It does not speak very well for this Island, an agricultural country, to have to import such large quantities of hay. We hope the lesson our farmers have received will teach some of them the folly of wintering so many cattle.

Several very large cargoes were shipped in the steamer on Tuesday night. They were owned by an American dealer.

Farmers who have not yet secured their Seed Wheat, will be able to do so in a few days, from Wright & Son, Bedouque.

Large quantities of oysters are shipped to St. John from this port every steamer. The folks there must consume a great many.

P. E. Island oats sold at Halifax the other day for 65 cents, and potatoes for 60 cents.

No further news of importance has been received in reference to the Metree assassination case. The authorities are collecting all the evidence they can. It is said that Whelan has fallen very much since learning that his conversation with Doyle was made public.

The Hon. Benjamin Davies has resigned his seat as a member of the Government. For what reason we have not heard.

Resolved, therefore, that this meeting now desires to withdraw the resolution passed at the said meeting, and to destroy any influence that expression of opinion may have created, as it is now the deliberate opinion of this meeting that the adoption of synods in the Colonial Dioceses will prove disastrous to the best interests of the Church of England and these Provinces.
