SUPREME COURT.—The June term of the Supreme Court commences at Summerside to-morrow. The criminal docket is very small, consisting of but one case of horse stealing in which the prisoner confessed. SCHOONER FLOATED.—The Agriculturist says that the schooner Riverdale, which stranded a few weeks ago at the Grand River, King's County, has been floated by Mr. Michael Burke. She is not seriously damaged, and will be put in good order again on the marine slip at Pictou.

HORSES AND CATTLE.—We learn from the Agriculturist that Mr. E. Gorrill, Tyne Valley, shipped three horses to the New Brunswick markets, last Thursday morning, and two or three were shipped by other parties. Mr. Thos. P. Lother, Amherst, left for home on Saturday morning last with four horses, which he purchased here. Messrs. Avard & Drummond shipped twenty head of fat cattle to John Macdonald, St. Johns, the same day.

COMING UP WELL.—One of Mr. J. A. Gourlie's Charlottetown correspondents, writing him under date of the 3rd inst. says: "I hear from Winan and others that Harry C. by Hernandez, 2891, owned by Connolly, trotted a mile to-day in 2.44, first quarter in 44 seconds, last in 38 1/2 seconds." This not only speaks well for Mr. Winan's skill as a trainer, Harry C. having been handled only about three weeks, but shows that that fine young horse possesses more than ordinary speed.—Agriculturist.

THE NEWFOUNDLAND MATTER

A NEW FEATURE.

HALIFAX, June 8. A new feature of the Newfoundland trouble is reported to-day. The people of Bay St. George recently held a mass meeting, and unanimously resolved that, inasmuch as the Newfoundland Government was unable to protect them from French outrages, that hereafter they would pay no duty on imports to the Newfoundland Government. A few days ago, the steamer Harlaw sailed from Halifax, with a cargo of supplies for Bay St. George, but, upon arriving there, the Customs officers, acting under orders from St. John, refused to allow the freight to be landed, on the ground that the importers had pledged themselves not to pay duties. It might have been supposed that the goods would have been landed and placed in bond; but the government was afraid to do that, as the people would simply have taken possession of the goods and the customs officers would have been powerless to prevent them. The result is that the steamer will bring her freight back to Halifax.

A Narrow Escape.

LONDON, June 8. The Anchor Line steamer City of Rome which left New York May 31 and arrived at Queenstown at 10 this morning had a narrow escape from destruction at Fastnet. She made land in a dense fog at 4 o'clock in the morning and was going slowly, taking soundings when she struck Fastnet Rock, about 3 miles seaward of Crookhaven, bow on. Her forefoot got on the rock and but for the promptitude displayed in reversing the engines a great fatality would have been recorded. The full extent of the damage cannot be ascertained until the vessel is docked at Liverpool.

Acadia College.

WOLFVILLE, N. S., June 7. The governors of Acadia College resolved yesterday to establish a new chair, to be called the Alumni Chair of Physics. The Alumni have agreed to provide the salary and ultimately to endow the chair. The Senate of the College has been asked to nominate a Professor for this chair, and it is expected that the appointment will be made in August.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, June 9. It is stated in official circles here that Sir Charles Tupper's mission has no connection with matters other than the Newfoundland question. He is, however, expected to visit Ottawa before returning to London.

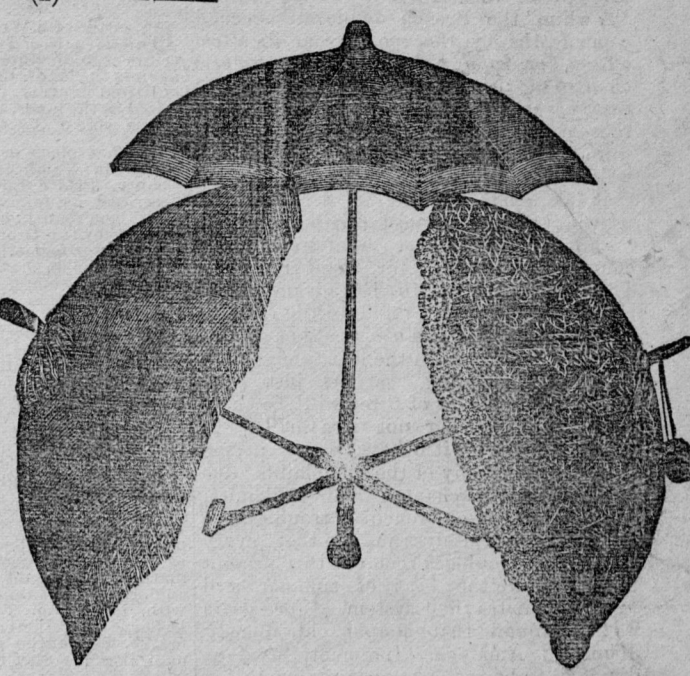

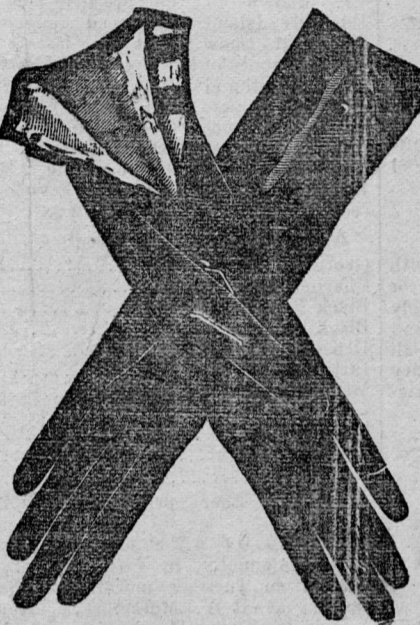
