THE RIFLE.
The Dominion Rifle Association Matches at Ottawa.
 Good Shooting by Haligonians.

OTTAWA, Aug. 31.—In the rifle shooting of yesterday Gunner Farrel, of the Halifax Artillery, won the first prize in the Nursery match, making the possible 25 points.
 The Bankers match was won by Private Gerrioe of the 66th fusilier, who also made the highest possible score.
 The McDougall Challenge cup was won by Private Fitzgerald of the 57th with a score of 47.
 An Order in Council has been passed permitting the storage of petroleum in bulk. Hitherto oil could be brought in in tank cars, but under the regulations it had to be barrelled immediately. The new arrangement will allow it to be warehoused until ready for delivery.

REBELLION IN INDIA.
Gallantry of Loyal Soldiers.

PESHAWARA, Aug. 31.—It transpires that several native officers at Fort Lundi Kotal showed utmost loyalty and valor when that post was attacked. One of them who received a bullet wound in the shoulder continued, despite his injury, to fight and encourage his men until the fort was captured.
 The Subadar who conducted the defence of fort Lundi Kotal, was killed during fighting. Among the attacking force were two of his sons, while another son fought at his side.
 The Subadar, who commanded the Mullago Company when the enemy entered the fort collected his men and gallantly cut his way through the ranks of the attackers. He lost several men; but reached the road to Jamrud without the loss of a single rifle.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

CAIRO, Aug. 29.—All the gunboats of the Anglo-Egyptian expedition have passed through the fourth cataract of the Nile. Spies report that the enemy have evacuated Berber.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—Later advices in regard to the British steamer Gairloch, from Aberdeen, reported wrecked five miles north of Cape St. Vincent, and with eight of her crew drowned, are to the effect that no lives were lost.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Aug. 28.—The British cruiser Intrepid arrived at Port Royal yesterday and reports having intercepted on Wednesday, near Fortune Island, a filibustering vessel. The cruiser also boarded several steamers. After coaling, the Intrepid will go to Antigua to stop other filibusters.

WOMEN PAINTED THE FENCE.

The Church Couldn't Pay for the Work, so the Congregation Did it.

TRENTON, Aug. 28.—When the Rev. Dr. J. A. Mann, pastor of the Clinton Avenue Baptist Church, returns from his vacation he will find the church and fence surrounding it bright with new paint. The congregation is not a wealthy one, and a few weeks ago when it was proposed to paint the property the men of the church offered to look after the building if the women would take care of the fence, which is nearly 300 feet long. The offer was accepted. The building was painted two weeks ago, and the men began to think that the women intended to back out of the agreement.

On Friday Mrs. Israel Billingham, Misses Flora, Edith and Lizzie Root, Gertrude and Annie Stone, Meta Millette, Mrs. William Rapier, Mrs. George Mallette and Mrs. Rebecca Seiner appeared, clad in calico dresses and sun bonnets and armed with paint pots and brushes.

A pretty shade of salmon had been mixed for them by a professional painter and they began to put it on. They all say that the fence would look prettier if they had mixed the paint themselves, but as they could not agree on the color they decided to engage a painter as arbitrator and mixer.

The work was finished Wednesday. While it was in progress the strange sight attracted many spectators. Some of them praised the painters. Others criticised them for not employing men when so many are out of work. One of the critics was a well to do member of the congregation who departed hastily when one of the painters stopped work long enough to tell him that if he contributed more liberally the congregation could afford to pay for the work.

When the job was finished the painters were treated to pound cake by Mrs. Henry Plister who has a bakery opposite the church.
