#### A SAD FATE.

From the statement made by President Elderkin at the Maritime Live Stock Breeders meeting, it appears that Our Provincial Farmers and Dairymens Association has, like the Provincial Fruit Growers' Association, incurred the displeasure of our amiable Premier. For President Elderkin told the meeting that "Premier Farquharson had given his promise" that he would furnish funds to pay the travelling expenses of the gentlemen who had come to the Island to address the various meetings. He, President Elderkin, had advertised. At the same meeting, Mr. Hodson stated that when last summer he visited this province for the first time officially, as Dominion Live Stock Commissioner, he "found no organization in existence in the province with aims in unison with the work of his office." Mr. Hodson is a gentleman of undoubted probity, and, being a total stranger to our province, would naturally look to the Premier and other members of the government who were constantly in attendance for information in regard to legally organized effort.

We are compelled to conclude that for some reason, the neglect to inform Mr. Hodson of the existence, of the very much alive and effective association established by a special act of the Legislature was not from forgetfulness, but it was from ill-will that Commissioner Hodson was

not informed of the existence of the "Farmers and Dairymens Association" which was established by law with duties and aims strictly in line with the requirements of Mr. Hodson's office, one special and imperative work being organizing and calling public meetings for hearing lectures, addresses and discussions on live stock and other branches of agricultural science. This programme has been faithfully and effectively carried out annually, and only last winter, under President Simpson's judicious management, Professor Gilbert, of the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, in company with other speakers, addressed meetings and conventions in every important centre in the province.

If that Association is content with being thrust aside while its work is given to the president of an association having no legal existence in this province, then we must confess ignorance of the material Messrs. Simpson, McInnes and the directors and members of the branch societies are made of. The insult is not to the "Farmers' and Dairymen's Association" alone, but to our provincial institutions generally.
