

Coffee Shop At SDU Gains Popularity

With average receipts per day at St. Dunstan's University coffee shop about \$140, the recently-opened enterprise is gaining in popularity among SDU students.

Jim Davis, a graduate of SDU last year and present manager of the shop, said the shop employs three full-time waitresses and one dishwasher. In addition, eight students, two more than originally planned, are employed as part-time help. They work an average of 10 to 12 hours a week.

It has been proposed that separate counters be installed for orders requiring some preparation and those ready-made in order to speed up service.

It is estimated that a period of 10 years will be required to retire the debt of \$80,000 spent to put the shop in operation. This involved \$59,000 for building and \$21,000 for equipment, and includes an annual interest of six per cent.

The student reaction to the Coffee Shop is one of complete approval, the manager said. It is generally crowded to near its 100-student capacity, and members of the faculty frequently visit and chat with the students over a cup of coffee. Mr. Davis stressed that this leads towards better relationships between professors and students.

The policy of the shop is determined by an executive board comprised of Gerald Fitzgerald, a senior arts student from Summerside; Dave Morton, ju-

A new member, Foch McNally, was inducted, and the meeting adjourned.

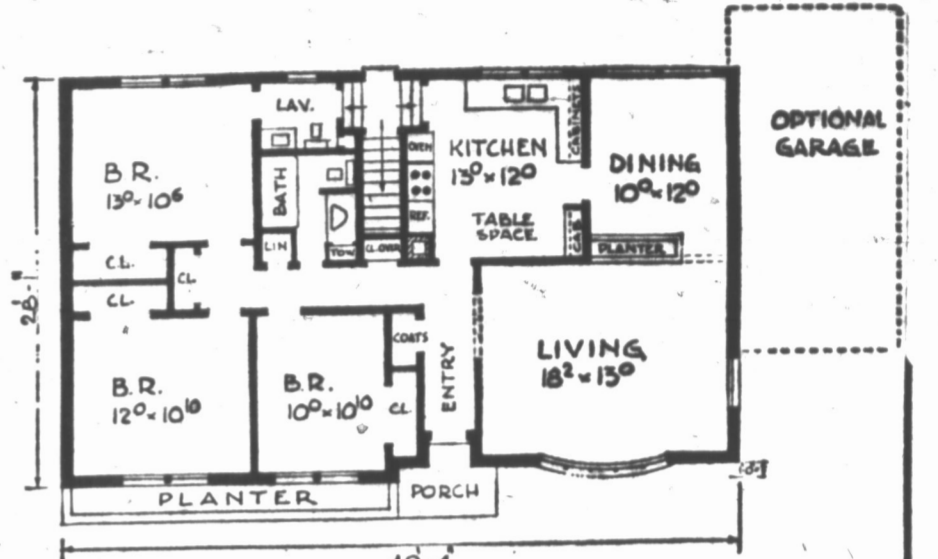
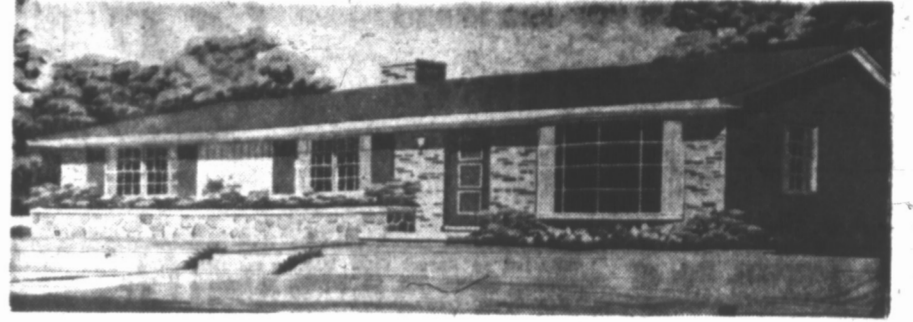
SQUINT COSTS \$10

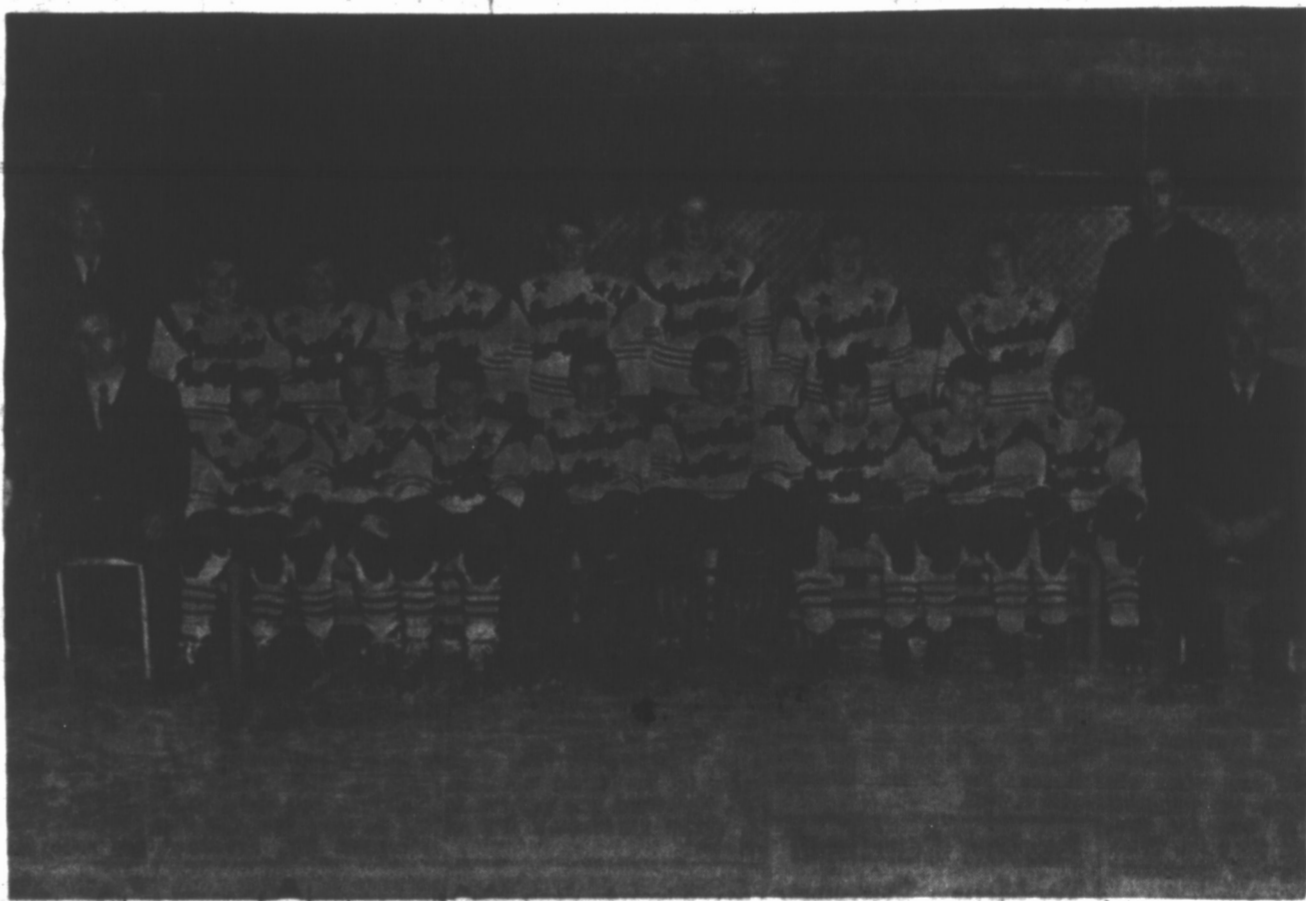
