News From Klondike

SEATTLE, Wash., July 2.—Over two hundred Klondikers with \$400,000 in gold dust on board have arrived from Skagway. The miners left Dawson as late as June 19, and bring much important news. Mers from Cape Nome had arrived up the river confirming the news of strikes there. They tell of pans being taken out ranging in value from \$20 to \$30. Four men on Layl Creek took out \$2,200 in four days. On Snow Creek \$1,500 was taken out in two days. On California Creek a man took out a nugget worth \$142.

The week ending June 14 saw \$3,000,000 worth of gold packed into Dawson from a dozen claims on Eldorado and Bonanza creeks alone. Several pack trains were employed transporting the treasure. From other creeks in the fabulous Klondike district—Hunker, Sulphur, Dominion, and from beach claims—gold was brought to Dawson in large quantities. There was no way of estimating any but the largest nuggets.

Professor Lippy's claim signed and demonstrated its great richness by giving up \$800,000 in treasure. The claim is No. 16, Eldorado, and is the richest in the entire Klondike. It has turned Lippy from a poor athletic instructor into a millionaire philanthropist.

President Schurman's View.

MANILA, July 4.—Professor J. G. Schurman President of the United States advisory committee for the Philippines, returned to Manila yesterday from a three week's tour of the southern islands. He takes an entirely hopeful view of the general condition of things there. The intelligent and substantial citizens desire an American protectorate. They are awaiting a settlement of the war in the island of Luzon before declaring themselves. They are chiefly anxious to be undisturbed. The president of the town of Santo Nicholas, and of Cuba, said to Mr. Schurman: "We want peace, food and prosperity, we do not wish a fight. He would be neutral." The president of the committee thinks that this declaration fully expresses the sentiments of the people of the southern island of the Archipelago.

THE GOVERNMENT NON-COMMITTAL.

Fielding Will Neither Admit Nor Deny.

REPORT THAT SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES WILL AMOUNT TO \$7,000,000.

Money Voted in the Meantime.

OTTAWA, July 5.—A large part of yesterday's sitting was occupied in the consideration of financial matters.

The Finance Minister (Mr Fielding) announced that progress had been made in preparing the supplementary estimates for the current year. He hoped that it would be ready this week.

Mr. Foster repeated the statement of a Government organ that the estimates would ask for seven millions and said it seemed to him rather late in the season for such a measure.

Hon. Mr. Fielding did not admit or deny the amount. Mr. Fielding explained that the new financial year had begun and that the public service might be embarrassed if part of the estimates were not voted at once. It was proposed by agreement with Mr. Foster to ask for a vote of one-tenth of that part of the estimates not yet voted.

This was done on the understanding that the vote did not commit the House to approval of the items.

A supply bill containing these items with those already concurred in was read the first and second time.

The Governor-General will probably come down and accept the vote on Thursday.

The Redistribution Bill was then taken up.

Mr. Clarke Wallace resumed the debate.

Mr. Wallace protested against the course of the Government in redistributing the representation at another time than after a census. If a precedent should be established that after each change of government there should be a new redistribution there would be no such thing as stability.

The discussion was continued by Messrs McMullen, Clancy, Bell (of P. E. Island) Ross, Robinson and Leyd.

House adjourned at 12 20 a.m.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Mr. Scott remarks that it is apparently a great deal easier to get challenges from this government than to get tribunals.

—The Government papers protest that proof is not wanting that the Yukon officials are all absolutely innocent of the charges preferred by Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper. Then, why not have the investigation which Sir Hibbert demands?

—The Rev. Mr. Ramsay, of Knox Presbyterian church, Toronto, in the course of his sermon on Sunday last, denounced the political corruption practised by the Liberals in West Elgin as tending to paralyse healthy national growth. A thou and pulpits throughout the land should echo the denunciation.

—Mr. W. T. R. Preston was recently appointed an immigration agent in Great Britain. It was he who organized the electioneering crookedness of which such a disgraceful manifestation has been made in the Provincial election in West Elgin. It is stated that a round robin demanding his recall by the Dominion Government has been numerously signed.

—A brainy Yankee has just written the following letter to an Irish Member of Parliament: "I noticed in cabled news here your expression that it would be most gratifying to you if a movement were started to purchase Ireland from Great Britain. The writer is accustomed to promote and organise large affairs, and would be most willing and anxious to handle such an undertaking. Under proper international organization, the sum of many hundred millions of dollars can be raised for this very popular plan, but the whole question must hinge on the desire of Great Britain to dispose of the property. All things are possible in this age, and on this side of the water nothing is too big for us to undertake. I should like to hear from you on this subject." Our republican cousins are always to be reckoned with when there's a chance for speculation.

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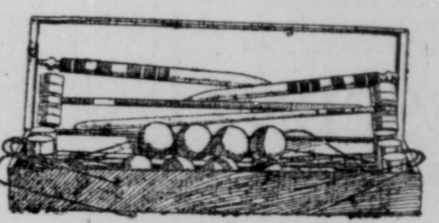
