India's Robber Chieftain Killed, Gov't Reports
 LUCKNOW, India. (Reuters)—A robber chieftain who stole from the rich, gave to the poor and ruled 8,000 square miles of forests in four Indian states, has been killed, the government announced Thursday.
 Man Singh, the 63-year-old "Robin Hood of India," two of his henchmen and a policeman were killed at Bhind, 200 miles south-east of the Indian capital of New Delhi.
 The announcement of their death was made here by the chief minister of state of Uttar Pradesh, Dr. Sampurnanand.
 Man Singh, who considered himself a Hindu holy man and secretly visited Hindu shrines, turned outlaw after serving 10 years in prison in connection with a killing growing out of a family feud.
FRIEND OF POOR
 Man Singh, whose gang was said to be the terror of the rich and friend of the poor, was wanted for murder, kidnaping and banditry. A reward of 15,000 rupees \$3,500 had been offered for his capture.
 Man Singh and his gang were virtual masters of 8,000 square miles of forest in India's four northern states of Uttar Pradesh, Vindhya Pradesh, Madhya Bharat and Raasthan.
 Last year his gang killed seven policemen and five other persons in two days.
 Man Singh distributed money among poor villagers, and won hundreds of allies who protected him against the police. His gang ruthlessly shot police informers.

32 Japanese Babies Reported Poisoned
 TOKYO. (AP)—Thirty-two Japanese babies have died in recent days from contaminated powdered milk and 3,274 throughout Japan are ill from the product, government officials reported Friday.
 The government radio cautioned against the use of powdered milk.
 Government chemists said they had found traces of arsenic in some supplies and that these crystals may have come from calcium added to the milk to enrich it.

U. S. Gov't Releases 26,000 Tons Copper
 WASHINGTON (AP)—Defense mobilization Arthur S. Flemming Thursday authorized diversion of some 26,000 tons of copper from delivery to the government to private industry. His order came atop news of a sharp rise in the price of copper from 40 to 48 cents a pound and was designed, Flemming said, to relieve the present shortage of copper supplies.
 In addition, Flemming approved a request by Lester Teator, assistant secretary of commerce, for the diversion to private industry of 1,260,000 pounds of nickel scheduled for delivery to the government in September.
