Seed Oats.

Good oats are clean, hard, dry, sweet,
plump, full of flour, rather like short-ear,
but a clear and almost metallic lustre.
Each oat in a well grown sample should
be nearly of the same size and there should
be but few small or imperfect grains.
The color of the oat is not very material
but white oats are generally thinner in
the skin than black ones. Again, black
oats will grow on inferior soils. Short,
plump oats are preferable to large long
grains. From first prize oats I have
grown seventy bushels, 34 lbs to the ear. I
have found the harvest on best cleaned
oats to produce the best crop. Farmers
try and get the best grain for seed that
can be got.

Ensilage for Sheep.

The most sceptical are now beginning
to concede the great value of ensilage for
making butter. Some are also beginning
to recognize its value for making beef.
But few, however, have thought of feed-
ing it to sheep in the forests of Mexico, and
it is claimed by British farmers, that
most excellent for breeding ewes and
lambs. It not only provides them with
an excellent and nutritious diet, but
when fed on ensilage the flow of milk
from the ewes is large, and the quality of
it is good. The fact of Canadian
farmers who have tried it have found it
gave excellent results in feeding sheep.
Here, then, is a wide door opened up for
extension of our work. In some sections
field roots will not grow well, while in
these localities corn may be grown.
There may thus be provided an excellent
ration for the sheep in the absence of
roots—a ration which will not only tend
to promote good health, but which will
be capital for both ewes and lambs. It
is very probable also that it will be found
that in fattening stores in winter the en-
silage will serve an excellent purpose, as
in fattening cattle. The moral fact is,
let every farmer living where corn may
be grown build a silo, if he does not now
possess one; and the second is, let him
increase the number of his sheep.—Live
Stock Journal.

Prohibition in Washington.

Washington, D. C., April 6 (Special
Correspondence).—It is estimated that
the bill passed by Congress prohibiting
saloons within one mile of the Soldier's
Home property will place about one-third
of the District of Columbia under Pro-
hibition, including the sections of 40 and 50
squares of the city of Washington. The
Commissioners have had a map of the
Soldier's Home property prepared and
they measure a direct mile from any part
of the boundary in fixing the Prohibition
limits. The saloons upon portions of the Home
property are greatly disturbed. They
claim the mile limit should be measured
from the Soldier's Home building, and
will probably contest the matter in the
courts. But such a measurement will
allow saloons upon portions of the Home
property. George C. Hazleton, Attorney
for the District, has written a letter to
the Commissioners in which he says that
all applications for license within the
prohibited territory must be refused.
Commissioners A. Ross and W. A. Van
Prohibition territory should be measured
one mile from the Home property, the
latter declaring this to be the understand-
ing of the committee which reported the
bill.

Barley for Swine.

Now that we cannot send our barley
to the United States market, we should
carefully consider the next best thing to
do with it. Happily there are many ways
in which it may be fed. At the Wiscon-
sin Experiment Station, Professor Henry
has been testing the value of barley
swine feeding as pitted against corn.
The result showed that the returns, pound
for pound of pork, were in favor of the
corn to the extent of eight per cent. If
the barley had been mixed with the corn,
it is not improbable that the results would
have been better than from feeding either
alone. In seasons then, when barley is
cheap, it will serve a good purpose as a
food adjunct in making pork. If a
variety of foods used be still further in-
creased, the returns would probably be
correspondingly better. At the Ontario
Agricultural College, a favorite food in
feeding swine is the following: Two parts
ground peas, one part ground barley, one
part ground oats, and one part wheat
middlings. This is a ration, the composi-
tion of which every farmer can grow for
himself, unless he be the wheat mid-
dler, in some way a very large amount
of barley may be used every year. At
the price which has ruled for barley in
the Dominion for the past winter, viz.,
about fifty cents per bushel, it formed
one of the cheapest foods for swine feed-
ing that was to be had in our markets.—
Live Stock Journal.
