Toronto, Sept. 9. On Saturday night fifty-seven elected in Ontario—fifty-one ministerial, two independent, and four Brownites or opposition. Montreal, Sept. 10. Forty-nine elections have taken place in Province of Quebec—forty-four in favour of the Government; only five for opposition. Out of sixteen elections yet to take place, the opposition will not carry five. Montreal, Sept. 5. Elections still going on favourably in Ontario. Three more seats expected to be gained by Ministerialists to-morrow. Dorian was about 70 votes behind in Hochelaga yesterday. No reliable returns received of to-day's polling, but Dorian said to be slightly ahead at noon. Rouges charge their loss of ten seats in Quebec to the interference of the Priests. Provencier, Editor of "La Minerva" was largely ahead in Yamaska yesterday and it is believed will be elected for Commons by large majority. London, Sept. 8. The report which reached here from Constantinople that the British captives in Abyssinia had gained their freedom proves to be without foundation. The Sublime Porte has again intimated to the European Powers that it cannot admit of any intervention on their part in the affairs of the Island of Candia, and therefore absolutely declines to adopt the project for a joint Commission of enquiry. Geneva, Sept. 9. The delegates to the Peace Congress are arriving from all parts of Europe. Gen. Garibaldi has reached the City from Florence. His reception by his friends and by the citizens of Geneva was most enthusiastic. He made a brief speech, in which he declared that his purpose to move on Rome was unalterable and that his plan of action though deferred would soon be carried into effect. New York, Sept. 10. A Special despatch from Montreal, dated to-day, says Hon. Mr. Dawson, the leader of the French Rouge party is 100 votes behind at the first days polling. The Rouge party are now hopeless as to the general result. The rejoicings in Vermont over the election of Colby, a noted annexationist, causes comment here. Paris, Sept. 9. A speech made by the Grand Duke of Baden at the Diet at Carlsruhe, in which he advocated an alliance with the North German Confederation, gives rise again to a feeling of uneasiness in political circles. Fears are entertained that the recent complications will be renewed, and that questions may arise which will again disturb the tranquility of Europe. Paris, Sept. 9, evening. Dr. Louis Desroze Veron, the celebrated French publicist, died to-day. New York, Sept. 10th. A Constantinople special by cable, dated 9th says the Russian Ambassador in this city, General Ignatoff, has presented to the Porte another note or his Government which demands the cession of Crete to Greece, and full equality to Christians and Mohammedans in all the provinces of Turkey. The demand is declared to be the ultimatum of Russia. An answer is asked for within ten days. In diplomatic circles war is regarded as almost inevitable. Gold 43 1/4.
