Increase Of \$675,000 Forecast For Pensions

Old Age Security pensions paid to residents of Prince Edward Island will increase by approximately \$675,000 in 1966 as a result of the reduction of the qualifying to 69 years in January, according to J. E. Green, regional director of Old Age Security for this province.

To date, 739 applications have been received in his office from persons who will qualify for first payment of the pension at age 69 in January, with a small number still expected to be received before the end of this month.

The additional revenue to the province from this source may be increased even more if all those in the 69 year age group who have not yet applied for the pension will do so immediately by contacting the Old Age Security office in Charlottetown in years.

GRADUAL INCREASE

Mr. Green reported that there has been a gradual increase each year in the number of pensioners in this province. Ten years ago the average number of pensioners paid each month was 7,932. By 1964, this number had increased to an average of 7,893 monthly, and during the current year the monthly average has reached 8,046. The average increase this year has been from 7,987 pensioners in January to 8,171 in November. This latter figure compares with 6,898 in November, 1955, or an increase of 1,273.

Ferry Traffic At Borden Continues To Increase

BORDEN - Traffic between Prince Edward Island and the mainland on Canadian National's ferries is continuing to increase.

During November, the service handled 27,995 passengers - 1,368 more than November, 1964, bringing the total to 587,870 for the first 11 months of this year.

The passenger traffic represents 74,868 more persons carried across the Northumberland Strait to the end of November by CNS ferries than for the same period last year.

The vehicles handled during November total 13,313 - an increase of 672 over the number carried in November, 1964, said J. G. Davis, manager of CNS Maritime area.

The statistics show 9,956 automobiles carried between Borden and Cape Tormentine, 1,908 trucks, 1,220 tractor trailers and 206 buses. The ferries Abegweit, Prince Edward Island and Confederation made 640 passenger-carrying crossings during the month.

RAPID SCHEDULE

Canadian National is operating the most frequent winter ferry schedule ever for Prince Edward Island. With two ships making a total of 20 crossings a day, the service is twice as frequent as last winter.

The ferries leave Borden and Cape Tormentine at 8 a.m., 9:25 a.m., 11 a.m., 12:25 p.m., 1:50 p.m., 3:15 p.m., 4:40 p.m., 6:25 p.m., 7:50 p.m. and 9:30 p.m.

CNS charter bus carried 1,348 passengers. Connections with CN mainland trains, the service is being run on year-round basis.

Schweizer, 45, came from Germany 12 years ago and bought 25 acres five miles north of here from Henry Stewart. Planning to sell a 10-acre plot recently, he had the land surveyed. The survey showed his home is located 750 feet off his own property.

Darlington Township land records show no present deed holder. The only record shows the property deeded from the Crown in 1786 to an unknown recipient.



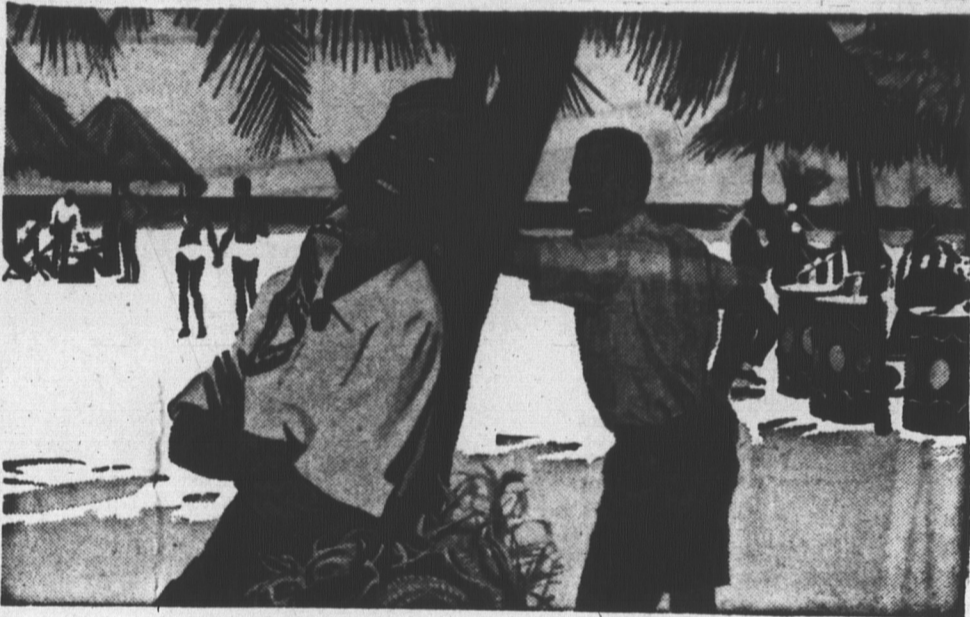
ALCOHOL ADVISORY COUNCIL MEETS
