CHURCH PARADE IN CH'TOWN OF MILITARY UNITS YESTERDAY

Brigadier G. G. K. Peake, D.S.O., E.D., recently appointed O. C. of Garrison Militia in the Province, headed the church parade of over 400 officers and men yesterday, the first since the re-arrangement of units. Major Ivan Harper, M.C., was Adjutant.

The parade left the armouries at 10:30 a.m. headed by the Recce band, under bandmaster R. F. Mugford, and proceeded to the War Memorial on Queen Square where wreaths were placed "in glorious remembrance" of the men of the different units who had made the supreme sacrifice in the service of their country.

Brigadier Peake placed the wreath indicating the P. E. Island Regt. (17 Recce), Lt-Col. A. W. Rogers, C.D., of No. 2 Military Garrison Headquarters (M), Lt-Col. K. M. Johnson, C.D., 5 Signals Regt. R. C. Signals and Lt-Col. J. K. L. Irwin, No. 5 Medical Coy. R.C.A.M.C. William Chlason sounded reveille and the Last Post. The above named officers commanded their respective units on parade.

Following the ceremony at the War Memorial, the parade moved off to Prince Street, where the Protestant members attended Divine Service in Trinity United Church, conducted by the minister, Rev. A. Frank MacLean, B.A. The Roman Catholic members, under command of Lt-Col. John A. MacDonald, continued in parade to St. Dunstan's Basilica where Mass was sung by Rev. P. L. Cass and the sermon preached by Rev. Reginald Phelan.

Following the church service, the units were re-assembled and continued the parade westward on Richmond Street past the saluting base on the south side of parliament building where His Honour Lieut. Governor T. W. L. Prowse took the salute. His Honour was accompanied by Capt. J. J. Connolly, V.R.D., Naval Aide, Wing Commander Alan MacMillan, Air Aide, and Surgeon Commander L. E. Prowse, V.R.D., private secretary.

During the March Past ceremony, Brigadier Peake relinquished command of the parade to Lieut. Col. John A. MacDonald and took up a position with the Lieut. Governor's party.

The parade was witnessed by a large number of citizens who lined the streets before and after the church services.

ensemble, particularly in unison numbers, also in rhythmic vigour and dynamic shading. PROVINCE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND NOTICE TO POTATO GROWERS

WITH RESPECT TO VOTER QUALIFICATIONS FOR POTATO MARKETING PLEBISCITE

NOVEMBER 10, 1954

In order that misunderstanding and confusion be kept to a minimum on voting day the following information is released for the assistance of Deputy Returning Officers and Agents and for the information of voters.

The Federation of Agriculture have appointed their official agents who have been requested to act in an impartial manner to the end that all qualified, but no others may have the opportunity of voting

- General qualifications: (Canadian citizens) 1. Voters must be British subjects. 2. Voters must have attained their 18th birthday on or before November 10, 1954. 3. The growing of one acre of potatoes in 1954 on land either owned or rented or placed at the disposal of a voter by a parent for the growing of potatoes is a necessary qualification. 4. Women who are growers in their own right and meet other qualifications are eligible. 5. A wife is not eligible to vote on her husband's qualifications. 6. A voter may vote in only one poll which must be the poll in which he or she resides. 7. In no case may two persons vote on one acre of potatoes nor three persons vote on two acres and so on. 8. Before receiving a ballot all voters will be required to sign a declaration which will have the same force and effect as if made under oath. 9. Penalties are provided for the signing of a false declaration. 10. Polls will remain open from 1.00 P. M. Wednesday, November 10th, until 9.00 p.m. the same day.
