Weill Disclaims Any Knowledge Of Title Bout

NEW YORK, (AP)—Al Weill, manager of heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano, said Monday he hasn't agreed to a Marciano-Danny Nardico title fight in Miami Feb. 24 or "any kind of a fight for Rocky yet."

Weill called The Associated Press over a story from Brockton, Mass., Rocky's hometown, which quoted Marciano as saying he was going to defend his title against Nardico in Miami, Feb. 24. Rocky was quoted as saying "I'm going to New York Thursday to sign for the fight."

"He must have been misquoted or misunderstood" said Weill. "Rocky don't know who he's going to fight next. He may not even fight in Miami. I ain't closed for any fight."

"I've been talking to Jim Norris president of the International Boxing Club on the phone," said Weill. "We've mentioned Nardico. Dan Bucceroni and Don Cokell as possible opponents for Rocky down here in Miami but we ain't see-

Noted Athlete Visits Hospital

VANCOUVER, (CP)—Doug Hepburn, chosen in a Canadian Press poll as Canada's outstanding male athlete of 1953, spent part of the Christmas holidays visiting the crippled children's hospital here.

Hepburn, 27, who won the world heavyweight weight-lifting championship in Stockholm this year, was born with club feet and spent much of his childhood in children's hospitals in Winnipeg.

"If I had had the advantages that children born with club feet have today," Hepburn said, "I would be much stronger than I am."

Treatment straightened Hepburn's legs, but left his right shorter and thinner than his left.

"I guess nature endowed me with so much strength that I could overcome my handicap," he said. "But there are hundreds who have nothing to help them."

Deny Hoax In Rugby Tour

TORONTO, (CP)—There was "no hoax implied or intended" in a visit to London by the Toronto and Montreal rugby football touring team, Wally Williams, publicity director of the Ontario Rugby Union, said Tuesday.

Williams was commenting on a report in the London Star which credited the touring team with the "greatest rugby football hoax of the century." The team from Canada was beaten 46-0 Monday by a London hospital pickup squad.

Williams said about 40 made the trip by chartered plane to London. The players were drawn from the Ontario union—which has 22 teams at Toronto, Hamilton, St. Catharines, Brantford and Guelph—and from Quebec union which has two or three teams.

"I wasn't out best team," said Williams. "You might say it was a representative good-will side."

The Ontario union, which is affiliated with the English Rugby Union, gave the team permission to play in England "as a goodwill gesture, not as a hoax."

Rangers Acquire New Left Winger

NEW YORK, (CP)—New York Rangers Tuesday acquired Glen Sonmore, 24-year-old left winger, from Cleveland Barons of the American Hockey League for an undisclosed amount of cash.

The Rangers' optioned forward Andy Bathgate, 21-year-old Winnipeg-born forward, to the Barons.

Sonmore, a native of Moose Jaw, Sask., has scored 13 goals and 12 assists in 31 games with Cleveland. He was to fly here for Tuesday night's National Hockey League game here with Boston Bruins.

Boxer Suffers Loss Of Memory

CHICAGO, (AP)—Oscar Battling Nelson, 71, former lightweight boxing champion, is in a psychopathic hospital today suffering from complete loss of memory.

Nelson, who earned an estimated \$300,000 in a 22-year fighting career that spanned the turn of the century, was moved from his small hotel room to the hospital Monday.

Dr. Clarence Geary, psychiatrist assigned to the case, said Nelson "is out of contact with the world and is suffering from senile dementia."

Nelson has been in his present condition ever since his wife died last Saturday.
