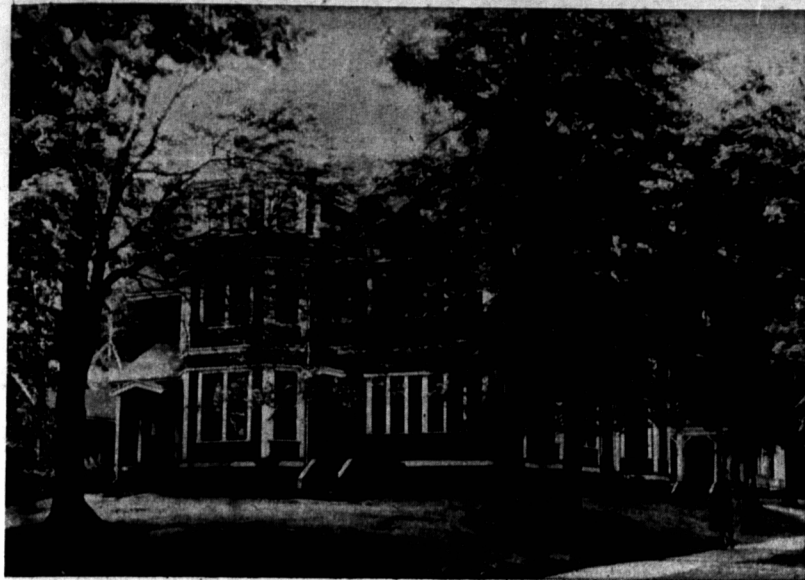

SITE FOR NEW BAPTIST CHURCH

The Charlottetown Baptist church has purchased the P. W. Turner property, shown here, as a site for the new church they plan to build next year, the Guardian learned yesterday from Nelson Good, chairman of the building committee. The site, on the corner of Prince and Fitzroy streets, is conveniently located diagonally across the street from the present church structure.

The present plan is to rent the Turner home until next spring when it is expected that construction will get underway. The hope is that the actual construction will begin in May and that the new church will be ready for occupancy within a year from then.

The present church is too small to accommodate the present congregation and there is no room on the present site to expand, the Guardian was told. The present church is alongside the church, is 83 feet by 114 feet. The Turner property is 120 feet by 140 feet. Although no definite decision has been made yet, the new site is close enough so that the present site, including the parsonage parsonage can be used if it is so desired, one member of the building committee told the Guardian.

Commonwealth Finance Ministers Meet Sept. 28

OTTAWA (CP)—Commonwealth countries have agreed to a conference of their finance ministers in London a month ago. Prime Minister Diefenbaker announced Friday. The four-day meeting will be held at Mont-Tremblant, Que., starting Saturday, Sept. 28.

Preparations for the conference are proceeding, the prime minister said in a statement from his office.

Mr. Diefenbaker proposed the September meeting during the Commonwealth prime ministers conference in London a month ago. One of its aims will be to discuss the Canadian government's hopes for a full-scale Commonwealth trade and economic conference next year.

His statement Friday indicated that all Commonwealth countries have accepted the invitation. He said formal invitations sent to them following the London prime ministers' conference have been accepted.

Commonwealth finance ministers will be in Washington earlier in September to attend meetings of the world bank, and will come to Canada afterwards.

Commission Probing Nfld. Finances Adjourn To Oct.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—A three-man royal commission investigating Newfoundland's financial progress since Confederation adjourned Friday until Oct. 7 when further sessions will be held in Ottawa.

The commission, under Chief Justice John B. McNeil of the New Brunswick Supreme Court, opened hearings here June 22. The other members are Sir Albert Walsh, Newfoundland's chief justice, and Professor John Deutsch of the University of British Columbia.

Chief Justice McNeil told provincial representatives the commission may want further information and "we are sure we will receive full co-operation." He, Professor Deutsch and federal government counsel Roland A. Ritchie of Halifax thanked the provincial counsel and Newfoundlanders for their hospitality and complimented Premier Smallwood on the high calibre of his deputy ministers who testified before the commission.

Army Recruiting Up Sharply Following New Boost In Pay

OTTAWA (CP)—Army recruiting increased sharply in the last two weeks of July, apparently as a direct result of boosts in armed forces pay.

More important to the army, the number of soldiers leaving the service dropped.

An average six-per-cent increase in armed forces pay, retroactive to May 1, was announced in mid-July. Besides the basic increase, there was a 20-per-cent boost in trades pay.

U. S. Ambassador To Cuba On Mat For Visit To Rebels
