Thoughts For Our Time

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

In my article this week, I would like to say a word or two to parents, especially those who have children at school.

Please don't be turned away at the mention of the subject of schools and education. I know very well how much you hear of it, how much you are reminded of your duties and obligations. But bear with me for a few lines more on a subject which you and I know is crucial.

I address my words to the parents, because God in His wonderful Providence has given to them, before the Church and the State, the primary privilege of education. I do not mean that the parents of a child can handle his education to the exclusion of the two other great educational agencies; all three are necessary for the full and complete education of children.

But in the order of time, parents are first, and with them rests the course of a child's development for the earliest teachings, habits, and ideas come from parents. As the saying goes: "Give me a child until he is seven, and then you may do with him as you like." An exaggeration, to be sure, but containing a very sound and basic truth.

There is a grave danger of handing over to the school more educational duties than it can or should take. A child who is well disciplined at home, will be well disciplined in school, and will, as a result, be in a much better position to do his lessons well. The undisciplined character and mind are at a disadvantage from the beginning; unable to concentrate, unable to control, unable to fasten the mind on truth and contemplate and love it, for its own sake in order and tranquility. It is imperative for the character of a child to be conditioned for learning by home discipline.

What sort of discipline am I speaking about? Discipline is something that goes very deeply into the soul of a person and influences many of his acts. The discipline given by training in good manners, in silence before elders, in restraint and control of enjoyments—all these are beneficial for conditioning the mind of a student.

Then, more directly, the rigid restricting of TV to few and good programs, the supervision of lessons and homework and the cen-

sure and punishment of misconduct and laziness—all these give the spirit of a child a freedom and soundness that make learning move forward properly, and issue in citizens who are intelligent and stable.

To indulge children in all their desires, to shrink from giving correction and discipline and punishment, is to do them a grave injustice. King David in his wisdom thanked God for chastising him because it made him see things so very much more clearly. Discipline brought wisdom to David.

"Before I was afflicted," he says, "I erred... It is good for me that I have been afflicted, that I might learn Thy commandments." It is not love to refrain from disciplining one's children; it is a very dangerous kind of selfishness.

Just as parents must share the task of discipline with the school, so they must share the imparting of truth. The school cannot possibly give to a child all the truth he is capable of receiving, nor all the instructions he needs in particular circumstances and at particular times.

Parents, for example, whose children are on the threshold of manhood and womanhood should face up to their delicate but very important duty of educating their children in matters of sex, of their new social position, of the dangers they will meet, and of the proper safeguards. Ignorance in these matters is very dangerous and false information is deadly. The wonders of life may be difficult to explain but they need never lose the sacredness and dignity in which God created them.

There is a great deal, too, merely

in taking an interest in what our children are learning. To be close by to inspire, encourage and help a son or daughter is perhaps the best way to foster the child's education, as well as to maintain his confidence and love. One can hardly expect the intelligence and will to flourish in the arid atmosphere of disinterestedness. Be keenly aware of what your children are learning, and stand by to do your part in this tremendous development—the making of a man. Parents, do not be discouraged by the obstacles you must face, or by the size of your task. God, who has called you to do this work, will not be wanting to your needs, for He is faithful. And bear in mind that in educating your own child you are educating the nation.
