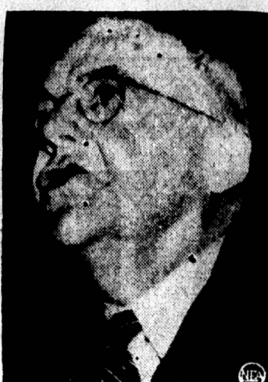

MONTREAL, Jan. 29 — (CP) — The United States dollar today closed at 1/32 from Monday's close. That is, it took \$1.00 1/32 Canadian to buy 1 American.

Takes Oath As Canadian Privy Council Member

OTTAWA, Jan. 29 — (CP) — Earl Alexander was admitted to membership in the Canadian Privy Council today—the highest honor this country can bestow.

He took his oath of office in a simple, 15-minute ceremony in the Privy Council chamber in the Parliament Buildings, with Prime Minister St. Laurent and other state officials in attendance.

Later, the 60-year-old former Governor-General told reporters: "I am very highly honored and very deeply moved that this high honor has been given to me. It is the highest honor that Canada can give to anyone and I am naturally very proud of it."

"It also keeps up my contacts with Canada and I am very happy because it means I will not be severing my connections with this country."

Lord Alexander, who becomes Britain's Defence Minister March 1, is one of the few non-Canadians—others are the Duke of Windsor and Prime Minister Churchill—who have become members of the Canadian Privy Council, which theoretically constitutes the King's advisers in Canada.

The ceremony also meant that he becomes a member of the Canadian Council before he takes his place in the King's Imperial Privy Council as a member of the British cabinet.

He declined to comment on his appointment as British defence minister, announced in London last night.

"I'd better wait till I take up my job and see what it's all about," he said. As he left Rideau Hall for the swearing-in ceremony, Lord Alexander told a reporter he felt that he had done all the things he planned to do as Governor-General and had enjoyed doing them. Most of all he had intended
