Mysterious Disappearance. Anna Doherty, a middle aged woman who has been living with her brother, John Doherty, on Sheriff street, St. John, disappeared a week ago and a thorough search has failed to reveal any trace of her.

Death of an Aged Rector. The death is reported of the Rev. Edward B. Nichols, D. D., after a long illness. He was born at Hely, N. S., in the year 1816, and was therefore in the 77th year of his age.

Judge Kelly's Property. The Guardian reports that the property of the late Judge Kelly was yesterday sold at auction by Mr. Leonard Morris, auctioneer. Mr. K. E. Ellis was the purchaser of the house, the sum paid being \$560.

A Voice from the far West. The Colonist, of Victoria, B. C., says: "The Hon. Donald Ferguson, who was appointed to the Senate to fill the seat left vacant by the death of Hon. Donald Montgomerie, of Queen's County, Prince Edward Island, is not a lawyer, as is represented in our Ottawa telegram of the 21st inst., but a practical farmer, who by sheer force of ability and strength of character raised himself to the front of the public men of the Island province. He was an able, a courageous and a persevering advocate of confederation at a time when to a confederationalist was to be misunderstood and to be misrepresented. He afterwards became a member of the Conservative Government under the leadership of Mr. Sullivan, now Chief Justice of the Province. He filled the offices of Land Commissioner and Provincial Secretary for many years most creditably. Senator Ferguson is a man of talent. His industry is literally indefatigable. He is a very effective speaker, and his intelligence is of a high order. He is, besides, a comparatively young man. He will be sure to make his mark in the Senate."

The Price and Catch of Seals.

A mild sensation has been caused at Victoria, B. C., by the publication of a letter signed by Joseph Bosowitz, one of the best informed men in Canada, and a resident of Victoria, in answer to Captain Cox, president of the Sealers' Association of B. C. Bosowitz asserts that the sealers, at heart, are well pleased with the outcome of the arbitration, and that their profits have been proportionately larger during the continuance of the modus vivendi than ever before, prices having by it improved. The regulations, he says, leave ample time for the satisfactory prosecution of pelagic sealing, and at the same time will prevent drugging of the world's market, and thereby maintain prices as well as demands.
