Winnipeg Blue Bombers Win Way To Cup Finals

WINNIPEG, (CP)—Winnipeg Blue Bombers, relying mainly on rookie Canadian talent for their scoring, swept into the Grey Cup final Saturday with an easy 24-4 victory over Toronto Balmy Beach before 15,800 cheering fans.

The game, first sudden-death cup semi-final played in western Canada in the colorful history of the classic, was a warm-up for the Western Interprovincial Football Union champions who were overwhelming favorites to whip the Ontario Rugby Football Union titleholders. Silver line power gave Bombers the triumph.

The well-drafted Toronto team held a 4-0 first-quarter lead as Bombers failed to scrimmage the ball out of their own end of the field, but wilted under the fast-charging Winnipeg front wall, led by import tackles Dick Huffman and Tommy Tinsley and defensive end Tommy Hamley, former Toronto Argonaut and Beach star.

Moncton In 2-0 Win Over Amherst

MONCTON, N.B. (CP)—Moncton Flyers took a 2-0 shutout victory from Amherst, N.S. Meteors as the New Brunswick Senior Hockey League opened its 96-game schedule Saturday night. Gilles Boisvert, Trois Rivières left to hockey, had the best view of the goal from the Amherst nets but little time to enjoy it. From the opening the Flyers kept the puck in the Nova Scotian's end of the rink, and only a spectacular performance by Boisvert kept the score within bounds. Donnie Deware in the Moncton nets got his shutout with only 13 saves in the Amherst goal was battered with 41 shots.

C.A.H.A. Back In Squabble Over Jacques Marcotte

MONTEAL, (CP)—The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association Sunday got back into the squabble over goalie Jacques Marcotte of Quebec and will give a once-and-for-all decision Dec. 7.

There was a night not so long ago when Buffalo defeated Syracuse 8-1 in an American Hockey League game. Midway through the game Eddie Shore, coach of Syracuse ordered his players to ice the puck every time the disc crossed their blue line but even then the Buffalo goalie had far more than nine shots to stop.

The Islanders weren't icing the puck too much in their game against the Islanders but they weren't crossing the blue line either rainily because Gus Gustavson and Bill LeBlanc were handing out crushing body checks. It was a night when Wywrot ever got hit as softly as he did in the second period when LeBlanc bounced him behind the Islanders net. Coach Terry Reardon of the Sydney Millionaires will meet some one on his own blue line tonight who should remind him of his younger brother Kenny, the rough-tough rushing defenseman of the Montreal Canadiens a few years back.

That someone will be "Wild Bill" LeBlanc, the body belting, hop, skip and jump defenseman of the Islanders who in some respects is a similitude of the Canadiens Reardon, the toughest defenseman in the N. H. L. in his heyday.

Terry Reardon played against his brother Kenny, the same as he will against LeBlanc. The Sydney coach played with the Boston Bruins at the time that his brother played for the Canadiens. They were the last brothers to play against one another in the N. H. L. until the Wilsons of Detroit and Chicago came along.

The Islanders will be at full strength tonight for their tilt with the fast skating Millionaires. Gustavson and Ritchie, who missed Saturday's game against Glace Bay, will be in uniform.

For the improving Islanders this is another good chance to move upwards in the standings. Last week in four starts they won half their games to hold their own. This week they intend to move along at a better than 500 clip.

The Islanders can move into a third place tie with the Glace Bay Miners by whipping the Millionaires. The Atlantics lead the League with 28 points followed by Sydney with 26.

But defeating the youthful Millionaires has been no easy task this season. Full of fight and bounce their big, rugged forwards have been playing top notch hockey to stay near the top of the circuit.

The Millionaires will have a full line-up with the exception of La-Croix. The smooth skating centreman has been sidelined with an injury and will likely miss tonight's game.

Several years ago Roger shared the goaltending duties of the Cleveland Barons with Johnny Bower. The two battled for the honors for a number of seasons. Bower joined the New York Rangers this year and is a sensation in the N. H. L.

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## Hamilton Tiger-Cats In 22-11 Win Over Alouettes

MONTEAL, (CP)—Hamilton's powerful Tiger-Cats wore down the spirited but weakening Montreal Alouettes Sunday in a bitter-fought football game to take a 22-11 decision and become the east's representatives in the Grey Cup final against Winnipeg Blue Bombers.

The Cats struck for two touchdowns in the fourth quarter, a tense 15-minute stretch that erupted into one last explosion of excitement when red-headed John O'Quinn leaped from the Montreal bench and nailed touchdown-bound Bernie Cusis.

In the final analysis, it was the difference and gave the Tiger-Cats two victories in a row over the Alouettes in the Big Four league's best-of-three final. The Cats won in Hamilton last Wednesday 37-12.
