One old saint who was about to depart, was reminded of friends awaiting her beyond, and she answered: "Friends! There is only one friend! It is He who said as He approached the foothills of Calvary: 'I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go to prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you unto Myself, that where I am, there you may be also.'"
