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Opening Sessions Yesterday At O'Leary Of West Prince Teachers Convention
-The opening day's sessions of the West Prince teachers convention at O'Leary yesterday was presided over by the president, Mr. Earle Jelley. There was an enrollment of fifty-five teachers.
A demonstration on the subject "What I expect to do with my pupils this year" was carried out by the president.
General secretary, Miss Estelle Bowness, gave an encouraging report on the activities of the P. E. I. T. F. for 1953-54 including reports of her attendance at various Federation meetings on P. E. Island and elsewhere.
Dr. L. W. Shaw, director of education, the next speaker gave an instructive lecture on the recently authorized texts on science and carried out a number of experiments, explanatory of phases of science.
At the afternoon session Dr. Frank MacKinnon, principal of Prince of Wales College and representative for Maritime Provinces on the committee of research work in education, was called upon. In a very fine address the speaker said that the teachers part in education is more direct and guiding rather than too much teaching.
The primary subjects are important, he said, so also are the secondary studies. Do not over-emphasize the secondary subjects viz. science, hygiene, etc to the detriment of math and language. Language is the vehicle of thought, classics, therefore is the art of communication of the highest form.
Comments by Dr. MacKinnon on the reading of the entrance examinations were amusing as well as instructive.
The next speaker, Mr. Merrill Callaghan, inspector of schools, discussed the use of the supplementary to the course of studies and a number of other educational topics.
Rev. C. O. Howlett, a former public school teacher, spoke in a very encouraging manner to the group.
