

Local and Other Items.

She sailed on return at noon to-day, with a cargo of mackerel, potatoes, oats, etc. The steamer Carroll, Capt. Brown, will sail for Boston this afternoon at the usual hour.

HEAVY BEREAVEMENT.—Mr. Fred. Dammottell, of the P. E. Island Railway, has sustained a double calamity in the death of his daughter and wife. Both have fallen victims of fever. Mr. Dammottell has the sympathy of his comrades in the railway department and of many friends throughout the city at this time of his great bereavement and sorrow.

DEATH OF A CLERGYMAN.—Rev. J. Embree, Methodist minister at Albert, N. B., died of malignant diphtheria on Monday last, and on Wednesday (the day of the funeral) one of his daughters fell a victim to the same disease. The remaining portion of the family are all very low with the epidemic. It is only a few years since Mr. Embree was transferred from Newfoundland to this Conference.

WANT THE EXPRESS CONTINUED.—It is stated that the business men of Georgetown, Souris, and other points in the eastern section of the Province, are about presenting a petition to Superintendent Unsworth, asking that the Eastern Express train be continued until the New Year. THE EXAMINER is sure that Mr. Unsworth will do all that lies in his power to accommodate the people of King's County.

ARTISTIC.—A well executed piece of pastelle work in the form of a portrait of a young lady, may be seen in the show window of Johnson's Drugstore. Miss Maud Johnson is the artist. An enlarged likeness of a Frederickton gentleman named Currie, from McGerrity's studio, St. John, is on view at Mr. Isaac Murley's establishment, North Side Queen Square. The work is well done. Mr. McGerrity, it will be remembered, won first prize at the St. John Exhibition for pictures similar to that on view here. Mr. Murley will take orders for these pictures.

Among the large collection of well executed photographs in the show window of Mr. Lewis' studio to-day, we noticed excellent likenesses of Chief "Jim" Louis, Mr. Cameron's trotting mare Blackbird, and Mr. Richards' Shetland ponies.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—Mr. Albert E. McLeod, a clerk in the grocery store of J. D. McLeod, Esq., had a very narrow escape from death yesterday afternoon about five o'clock. It appears that while young McLeod was at work on the top flat of the building removing some boxes from about the hatch, he missed his footing and fell through the open hatchway to the ground floor, a distance of twenty-six feet. His fall was broken somewhat by his striking some bags of cracked feed on the ground floor. When picked up he was insensible. Drs. Taylor and McLeod were promptly summoned. An examination showed that the young man's arm was broken at the wrist and that his back and breast were also injured. McLeod was as quickly as possible removed to the P. E. Island Hospital where he is receiving every attention. To-day, it is pleasing to learn, he is reported "much easier."

AFTER MANY YEARS.—THE FATE OF THE SCHR. REBECCA WARREN ASCERTAINED AT LAST. Seventeen years ago last August, the fishing schr. Rebecca Warren, of Deer Isle, Me., was lost. She was seen by another Deer Isle crew just before a terrible gale, and never heard of again. The schooner was commanded by Capt. Fred. Pickering and had a crew of 12 Deer Isle men. At last, after all these years, information has come concerning how and where these men died. The Rockland Opinion says Rev. J. J. Wright, the Methodist clergyman, who came to Deer Isle this year, was at Tignish, Prince Edward Island, at the time of the great gale. In conversing with a relative of Captain Pickering, a few days ago, he chanced to tell the story of his recollection of the gale, and the wreck of a fishing schooner on the Northern Cape bar, near Tignish, and the drowning of all on board. The bodies all came ashore, and were buried there, neither they nor the vessel ever being identified. From the number of the bodies, and Mr. Wright's description of them and the vessel, there can be no doubt that it was the Rebecca Warren.

THE LATE STORM.—The Journal reports that a good many of the oyster fishermen's boats on the North Shore (Richmond Bay) were broken up by the storm on the 6th inst., and still larger numbers were destroyed or injured by the storm of Sunday last. The tides were much higher at this storm than at the previous one.

THE JOURNAL SAYS THAT THE REPORT WHICH WAS CURRENT IN Summerside a day or two this week that a son of Capt. Sam White, of Fifteen Point, had been washed overboard from Capt. White's schooner, while on the voyage from here to Point du Chene on Saturday last, is, we are pleased to say, without foundation.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Oct. 15. The Ministers of Justice and Public Works returned to the capital to-day. Consul-General Munderloh interviewed the Cabinet Ministers to-day on immigration and ocean mail matters. Principal Grant's famous address at Toronto recently is a prominent topic of discussion here. It is generally considered the greatest speech of his life. It has transpired that a combination exists between the glass manufacturers of Germany and the United States, the former having refused a Canadian agent to fill an order for forty tons of plate glass for delivery in the Western States, except at the combine prices, which are much above those charged Canadian purchasers.

WILL CONFORM TO THE LAWS. NEW YORK, Oct. 15. The Independent to-day published a telegram received from President Woodruff, of the Mormon Church, and Gov. Thomas of Utah concerning the action of the Mormon Conference which is conclusive. The Church has no disposition to violate the laws or defy the Government. Gov. Thomas says polygamy has been buried never to be resurrected in Utah.

INSPECTING NICKEL MILLS. TORONTO, Oct. 15. Two officers of the United States navy have just completed an inspection of the nickel mills at Sudbury, in this province, for the purpose of ascertaining their capabilities for furnishing the amount of nickel required to manufacture steel for the new United States warships. It is understood that they will recommend the Sudbury nickel for the purpose.

BIRCHALL IN JAIL. WOODSTOCK, Ont., Oct. 15. Birchall keeps a diary, and counts each morning the remaining days he has to spend on earth. He is cheerful and talkative to those who have access to him, and while there does not appear to be much reason for it, he has not given up all hopes.

Want Birchall's Sentence Commuted. LONDON, Oct. 15. A petition to the Governor-General is being circulated for signatures in this city, praying that the sentence of death passed upon Birchall, the murderer of Benwell, may be commuted.

THE BONDING PRIVILEGE. WASHINGTON, Oct. 15. The Treasury Department will grant a hearing on Nov. 12th to persons interested in the question of the continuance of the bonding privileges to Canadian railroads doing business in the United States.

THE JAMAICA EXHIBITION. MONTREAL, Oct. 15. Commissioner Adam Brown says since the McKinley tariff has been put into force applications for space at the Jamaica Exhibition have greatly increased.

ON THEIR WAY TO PARIS. SHERBOURG, France, Oct. 15. Dillon, O'Brien and Clancy arrived here at noon to-day, and started for Paris at 6 o'clock this evening.

Got Fourteen Years. NEW YORK, Oct. 15. Dr. McGonegal, charged with malpractice in the case of Annie Goodwin, was to-day sentenced to fourteen years in States prison.
