Memorial Programs Given For East Prince

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN
Arrangements are being completed here and in surrounding areas for tomorrow's service commemorating the dead in two world wars and Korea.

In Summerside the Remembrance Day service gets underway at the cenotaph at 11 a.m. A parade, which will include veterans, a Legion color party, RCAF band, RECCO, sea and air cadets, will be followed by the RCAF Association, along with Cubs, Guides, Scouts and Brownies, will march off from the George B. Pearkes, V.C. Legion home at 10:45 for memorial square where service will be played by the playing of "O Canada".

Dr. Hillard Clark, president of the local Legion, will preside at the service and will read "The Shall Grow Not Old".

John S. Wright, president of APEC and member of the local Legion, will give the address at the Park and Dr. Cecil Webber will lead in the recital of the Lord's Prayer.

In a march past will then take place with Dr. Clark taking the salute.

OTHER SERVICES
Participants in the Remembrance Day service here will then motor to Travellers Rest where they will hold a service at 12 noon and afterwards proceed to St. Eleanors for a service at 12:15.

A reception at the Legion home beginning at 6:30 followed by a dinner at 7 p.m. and later a dance, will climax the day's activities.

Guest speaker at the dinner will be Hon. F. Walter Hyndman, Charlottetown, former Lieutenant-Governor of P.E.I. At Miscouche the Remembrance Day services get underway with a parade led by the Miscouche Band at 1:30 p.m.

A program will be held in the regional high school auditorium which will include exercises by students and military wreaths and poppies.

At 3 o'clock Legion members will proceed to Lot 16 for a military service at the cenotaph.

Hon. J. Walton MacNeung, Solicitor - General of Canada will speak at a banquet at the Miscouche Legion home at 6:30 p.m.

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Borden Council Discusses Fire Hazards Within Town

BORDEN — The local town council last night discussed the fire hazard situation within the town and decided that a committee be formed to look into several town buildings which are in poor condition in regard to fire escapes and other fire safety measures.

The meeting also discussed the possibilities of having a doctor take permanent office hours in Borden. They noted that since Dr. Daniel Stewart has left to put his full attention in the Bedeque area, Borden, Cape Traverse and other surrounding areas should get together and see what could be arranged in having a permanent resident doctor.

Councillor J.J. MacIsaac was appointed to represent the town on Remembrance day.

The council discussed a Blood Donor clinic which is to be held in Borden Nov. 16, and decided that due to shift work by many Borden residents, the clinic would be held during the morning hours.

The town ordered bills for the month in the amount of \$436.90 to be paid and in Councillor MacIsaac's police report it was noted that \$14.50 in fines had been collected.

Fifth Queens Liberal Ass'n Asks More Assembly Seats

The annual meeting of the Liberal Association of Fifth District Queens held last night passed a resolution calling for increased representation in the provincial assembly for 35th Queens with no loss of seats to other districts. The preamble noted fifth Queens constitutes 25 per cent of the population.

The meeting, held at the Legion home in Charlottetown, passed a resolution that when under the re-distribution bill in Ottawa it is being proposed that Queens County be divided into two ridings, this district go on record again in recommending that the fifth district of Queens be made one riding and the first, second, third and fourth districts be made the other four ridings.

A two-point resolution was passed concerning the Charlottetown Hotel asking how the new owners of the Hotel got a liquor license on the day they took over the establishment; and asking the provincial executive council recommended the sale of the Charlottetown Hotel district of province investors operating under the name of Island Development Company. A third point of the same resolution asked the Conservative members of Fifth Queens to tell the people why the lack of cooperation given city hall on housing and development of the promised industry of the area.

ALBERTON — The \$80,000 marine railway under construction here is reported to be progressing favorably and is expected to be completed by spring.

Hon. Leo Rostler minister of fisheries reported yesterday that concrete for the rail runway is now being poured and the construction started on the prefabricated cradle which will be ready for operation next spring.

Atlantic Enterprises Inc. of Charlottetown is doing the construction work. The railway will have the capacity of handling ships up to 100 tons.

The railway is not new. It was brought from Georgetown to be installed at Alberton.

Coun. Elmer MacRae said a sidewalk plow would be brought to the city on a trial basis this winter. Council agreed to stage a television panel on snow removal to inform the public on policies involved.

Fire Chief H. Jewell reported a total of 15 fire calls during October. Estimated fire loss for the month was \$20.
