QUEBEC'S SURPLUS—Quebec's civic finances show a surplus for the year of over \$5000.

MOUNT ALLISON COLLEGE—Three thousand students have been graduated from Mount Allison Ladies College during the last 45 years. There were 190 students in attendance this year; 145 received instruction in music; 128 in literature and 63 in fine arts.

VERY SUDDEN DEATH—Death in its most sudden form came to Thomas O. Nason, at his home in Waasis, Sunbury County, Monday evening. He was sitting in a chair after tea looking out of a window, when all of a sudden he gave a gasp and fell to the floor, and when assistance reached him he had ceased to breathe. He was 62 years of age, and leaves a sorrowing wife and family.—Moncton Transcript.

FATAL ACCIDENT—A very sad and distressing accident occurred at DeBert Station, N.S., one day last week, when the three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ivey Vance was killed by being crushed beneath the wheels of a loaded cart. Mr. Vance was loading a cart, when the little fellow climbed up on the fore part of the cart body, and the horses starting suddenly, the child was thrown off, fell beneath a wheel, which passed over his chest. The little fellow lived but twenty minutes.

A PECULIAR CASE—Judge Gaynor, of Brooklyn, has ordered the arrest and detention of a jurymen in his court who, on two separate occasions has stood out against the eleven other jurymen with whom he has been associated and thus prevented a verdict in either case. And yet this jurymen contends that he had as much of right to adhere to his opinion as his twenty co-associates had to adhere to theirs, and he proposes to fight the court if necessary on the issue.

THE RUSSIAN FAMINE—The famine in Russia is now stated to be general over no less than seven provinces, and the number of peasants bordering on starvation is variously estimated at from 5,000,000 to 20,000,000. Up to this time the press censor at St. Peter-burg has prevented the publication of facts, so that the charitable public were kept in ignorance. The result is that the state of affairs in the suffering provinces has daily grown worse, and now it is feared that no effort that can be put forth can prevent the deaths of hundreds of thousands—perhaps millions. It is a frightful commentary on Russian government.

ADVANCE IN IRON PRICES—It is announced from London that the whole of the English and Scotch iron foundries have issued circulars advancing prices of special black export goods, such as three-legged pots, Danish pots and stoves, and camp ovens 10s per ton. This is the first advance since the rise in pig-iron, and embraces Glasgow and Scotland generally, Lancashire, Birmingham Wolverhampton and other districts. American foundry pig-iron, used for many of these goods, has advanced 12s 6d per ton, and some other descriptions of American pigs 20s to 30s per ton.
