Hydro Generates Heat In C. Election Campaign

QUEBEC (CP)—More heat generated in British Columbia political arguments hydro-electric power development than by any other federal issue. The Liberal party horse-race being produced by Finance Minister James Sinclair, whose riding is Coast-Capitol. W. A. C. Bennett is the Credit dynamo, sparking party's opposition to Liberal trusts. Province now generates 2,000 horsepower from hydro-installations and it is estimated B.C.'s untapped rivers hold another 20,000,000 horsepower. Province's fast-expanding industrial complex urgently needs additional power and all parties urge hydro-electric development. But they differ on how it should be done. One of the development plants is the 1,216-mile Columbia, largest river system in America, whose headwaters are in B.C. but which flows through Washington and Oregon to the Pacific. Sinclair said here at a press conference March 25 that the federal government is willing to help public power development in Columbia. He spoke of \$300,000,000 federal aid week when Prime Minister Mackenzie King was here he reiterated that he has nothing to spare or

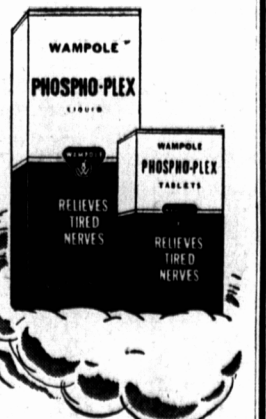
