New Cheese Packaging Method In Operation

A new technique in cheese packaging, resulting in a one-half and one pound package of cheese being introduced on the market, was reported on yesterday by Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture. The packaging necessitated the manufacture of cheese back in the factory into rectangular form in twenty pound blocks instead of the old round cheese. These blocks were placed in storage. A new cutting machine was ordered from the manufacturer and recently installed, and within the last few days the machine was placed in operation, cutting the original twenty pound cheese into one-half and one pound blocks. Increase Shown In Rail Exports

Paced by the three main shipping commodities of the Province exports during the month of December showed an increase of 321 carloads over the same month of 1950. The items responsible for the increase were potatoes with 575 cars compared to 468; turnips with 133 carloads compared to 89; and roughwood with 245 cars as against 32 the previous year. In all the Province last month shipped by rail 1,216 carloads while in December 1950 the car ferry service between Borden and Tormentine handled 895 cars.

that underlying inflationary pressures—which sparked the restrictions and the tightening up last March—are still strong and restraint in the use of credit still essential. One factor the government considered was the decline in the cost-of-living index by one-tenth of a point during November to 161.1, from the peak of 191.2. The index is based on 1935-39 prices equaling 100. Another consideration—not mentioned in Mr. Abbott's statement—was an appeal particularly by the automobile industry, that restrictions were killing business. Mass lay-offs developed at some plants.

While it wasn't possible to see clearly into the future, said Mr. Abbott there will be more relaxations if inflationary pressures ease. But, on the other hand if inflation became more intense, "the government would not hesitate to tighten up again."

In Toronto W. R. Williams, sales manager for Austin of Canada, said he felt the modifications will be a boon to the Canadian market for smaller British-made automobiles. But G. Napier Simpson spokesman for the Canadian Electrical Manufacturers' Association, while welcoming the move said "We would have liked to have seen a reduction in the down payments." About 90 per cent of "our market," he added "is made up of people who buy out of their weekly pay cheque. The extension to 18 months helps but they still have to scrape together the down payment."
