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## CURRENT NEWS NOTES.

A Canadian Romance.

A REJECTED MONTREAL MAN MARRIES HIS SWEETHEART AFTER THIRTY-SIX YEARS.

The *Montreal Star* gives an interesting love sketch from life. Thirty-six years ago there lived in that pleasant little town down the river called Sorel—very little it was then—a youth and a maiden. The name of the youth was George Beaupre, the name of the maiden Mary Anne Pearce. They belonged to families of moderate circumstances. He, with the strength and devotion of honest young manhood, loved this maiden, and wooed her with that earnestness which only such a lover can. He was given every encouragement, was, some say, naturally accepted, was congratulating himself, at least, on the smooth courting of true love, when suddenly a rival appeared, and everything for him turned black. The rival was one Jacob Savage of the same town. Pretty soon she and Savage were married and settled down in the place, and then young Beaupre's hope died out. He tried to work on as before, but could not. He closed up his business, settled up his affairs, and started to the far West, towards which so many adventurous spirits were about that time shaping their course. From that day to within two weeks ago he had not set foot in that part of Canada. He had worked hard, saved carefully, prospered and laid up property worth at least \$200,000. He had never married. He was getting up towards 60 years of age. Several weeks ago he took an idea to come back once more to see his friends, and he started east. He searched out relatives in Sorel and Montreal, but found few that he remembered. He inquired for the woman who as a girl had so many years before thrown him overboard for a rival. THE SITE IS A BEAUTIFUL ONE FOR A SUMMER RESIDENCE, AND IT IS, WE BELIEVE, THE REV. GENTLEMAN'S INTENTION TO REMODEL THE HOUSE, PREPARATORY TO TAKING UP HIS QUARTERS THERE DURING THE HEATED TERM OF 1883.

PROF. BROOKS, OF THE RED HOUSE OBSERVATORY, NEW YORK, REPORTS THE OBSERVANCE OF A MAGNIFICENT AURORAL DISPLAY EARLY ON THURSDAY MORNING, THE GRANDEST SCENE IN MANY YEARS. THIS ACTION WAS CAUSED BY THE ACTION TAKEN AGAINST THE COMPANY BY THE DEPARTMENT OF CUSTOMS FOR ALLEGED IMPROPER RATING OF "GLASGOW HEADS," SO CALLED BECAUSE THEY ARE MANUFACTURED IN GLASGOW.

MESSES. WOOD, HUMPHREY AND PAWETT MADE A SHIPMENT OF 160 HEAD OF CATTLE TO HALIFAX ON THURSDAY, 9TH INSTANT, TO TAKE THE STEAMER "CASTALAN," FOR LIVERPOOL. THE CATTLE WERE LIGHTER AND YOUNGER THAN THOSE USUALLY SHIPPED, BUT IT IS THE INTENTION OF THE SHIPPERS TO FEED MOST OF THEM ON THE OUTSIDE FOR SOME MONTHS BEFORE OFFERING THEM FOR SALE.—Post.

MRS. SCOVILLE LECTURED AT LONDON, ONT., BEFORE A FAIR AUDIENCE, AND IN AN ELOQUENT AND IMPRESSIVE MANNER DESCANTED UPON THEATRICALS AND HANDSHIPS SHE HAD BEEN MADE TO ENDURE AT THE HANDS OF AN INSANE HUSBAND AND TWO OF HER THREE MISGUIDED CHILDREN. HER ADDRESS WAS ENTHUSIASTICALLY RECEIVED, AND ON MOTION OF MAYOR MEREDITH, SECONDED BY AID. SKINNER, A VOTE OF CONDEMNATION WAS PASSED TO THE LECTURE, AND A RESOLUTION DENUNCIATING THE CONDUCT OF THE PHYSICIANS AND COURT WHO PRONOUNCED HER INSANE, UNANIMOUSLY PASSED. SHE DECLARED HER INTENTION OF RETURNING TO CHICAGO TO PROSECUTE A NEW TRIAL.

A HEAVY FAILURE.—Messrs. D. Arnett & Co., wholesale dry goods, Toronto, have assigned. The principal creditors are the Ontario Bank, direct and indirect, \$150,000; Forestreet, Warehouse & Co., London, Eng.; \$50,000; Barber & Co., Toronto and Georgetown, \$10,000; Peter Ryan, Toronto, \$35,000; a Glasgow (Scotland) house, \$10,000. THE ASSETS ARE NOT EXPECTED TO REALIZE 20 CENTS ON THE DOLLAR. A NUMBER OF BRANCH HOUSES WILL FEEL THE EFFECT OF THE CLOSING OF THE TORONTO FIRM. LESSENING OF CREDITORS BY THE ONTARIO BANK IS SAID TO HAVE BEEN THE CAUSE OF THE FAILURE.

MR. GLADSTONE'S SPEECH IN MOVING THE THANKS OF PARLIAMENT TO THE TROOPS WHO SERVED IN EGYPT WAS SCARCELY EQUAL TO HIS USUAL UTTERANCES ON SPECIAL OCCASIONS. IT CONSISTED PRINCIPALLY OF EULOGIES ON THE VARIOUS COMMANDERS INDIVIDUALLY. HIS REMARKS AS TO THE ARMY WILL, HOWEVER, BE cordially endorsed. Here are his words:—"The army has not only a gallant people to depend upon, for that it has always had, but it is approaching at last to a powerful and effective organization; and when in a just cause there is a great object to be gained, that organization will be found effective for its end, and men will not be wanting, whether as admirals or whether as generals, to encounter the immense difficulties—the arduous labours—which in the moment of crisis are forced upon them, and to carry forward the flag of their country to honour and to victory."

TWENTY-FIVE SONS OF NOVA SCOTIA FARMERS, SAYS A NEW YORK PAPER, TIRED OF HUMDRUM AGRICULTURE, AND DESIROUS OF ADVENTURE, MADE A CONTRACT TO GO TO MEXICO TO WORK IN A SILVER MINE. THEY WERE PROMISED GOOD PAY, COMFORTABLE BOARD, AND ALL THE KNOWN SAFEGUARDS AGAINST ACCIDENTS IN THE MINE. AFTER A HORSEBACK JOURNEY OF 325 MILES FROM EL PASO, IN WHICH THEY WERE MENACED ALL THE WAY BY INDIANS, THEY ARRIVED AT CHAUHUATICH, A MINING VILLAGE WHICH FAILED UTTERLY TO SATISFY THE PROMISES. THE BOARD CONSISTED OF WRETCHED FARE, IN ROUGH SHEDS, AND THE MINE WAS SO DANGEROUS THAT THE NATIVES WOULD NOT WORK IN IT. THE SHAFT WAS 600 FEET DEEP, AND THE DESCENT HAD TO BE MADE ON A MEXICAN LADDER, WHICH WAS MERELY A NOTCHED POLE, OR IN THE BULLOCK SKINS IN WHICH THE QUARTZ WAS RAISED BY ROPE. THE NOVA SCOTIANS REFUSED TO WORK, AND WERE IMPRISONED FOR BREAKING THEIR CONTRACT. THEN THEY ESCAPED, AND STARTED ACROSS THE PLAINS ON FOOT, BUT WERE OVERTAKEN BY A MILITARY COMPANY, AND TWO WERE KILLED. AT THE END OF A YEAR AND A HALF OF HARDSHIP, THEY HAVE BEEN RELEASED, AND ARE NOW ON THEIR WAY HOME.
