## New Record Expected In TV At World Series

NEW YORK, Aug. 16 (AP)—Another record for spectators for a single event will be set when the forthcoming World Series is televised coast-to-coast for the first time. About 60,000,000 to 70,000,000 may watch the baseball classic.

The opening of the Bell Telephone System's \$40,000,000 transcontinental microwave relay to television Sept. 30 will clear the way for the series, starting a few days later, to have the greatest video audience yet.

It will take the series across the Rocky Mountains to stations in Salt Lake City, San Francisco, Los Angeles and San Diego. There are nearly 1,500,000 sets within range of those stations.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 16 (CP)—Increased selling today sent all grain lower in active trade on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange.

Early in the session, liberal offerings and hedging sales appeared in all commodities. Some selling was based on large western crop estimates and reports of no frost. Commercial demand was not aggressive, although American interests were fair buyers in oats. Early received support from shippers and processors. Exporters picked up flax. American houses were on both sides of the market in rye, with selling predominating in every way possible.
