COMMENTS ON CHURCH UNION
TORONTO, June 1 — (CP) — Insistence of the Church of England in Canada on keeping its system of bishops is one difficulty in the way of union between that Church and the United Church of Canada, says Rev. Gordon A. Sisco, secretary of the United Church General Council. In an article written in connection with the 25th anniversary of the founding of the Church, Dr. Sisco says the United Church cannot accept any implication that its clergy is not a real and effective ministry, even without bishops.

The 25th Anniversary of the Ordination of Most Rev. Charles Leo Nelligan (above) will be marked June 7th by services at Assumption Roman Catholic Church in Windsor, Ontario. P.E.I. he taught school in this Province, was a graduate of Laval University, Chancery of the Diocese of Edmonton, and became Bishop of Pembroke in 1937. He resigned the latter appointment in 1939, and was named principal Roman Catholic Chaplain for the armed services, in which capacity he served with distinction during the war years.

Malpeque Institute Presents Play

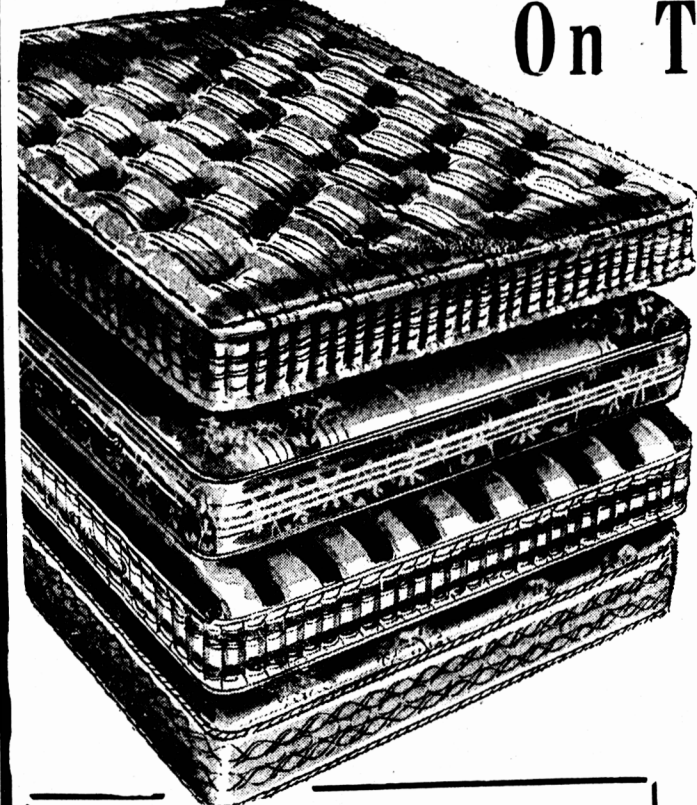
