NEW YORK (AP) — Rookie Gary Adams' goal midway in the second period gave Toronto a 1-0 lead in the first period when Toronto's 21 victory over New York Rangers Sunday night as the sturdy leaf defense withstood a last-period rally by the New Yorkers.

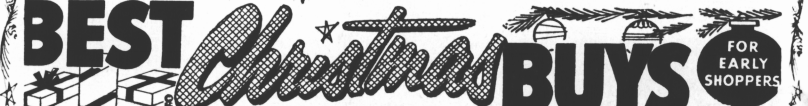
