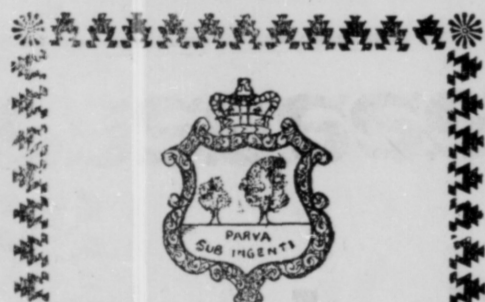

QUEEN'S WEST.

At a very large and representative convention of Liberal-Conservative delegates held today,—

William Campbell, Esq., of Sea View, moved, and M. P. Hogan, Esq., of Charlottetown, seconded the nomination of Mr. W. S. Stewart, Q. C.

R. B. Norton, Esq., of Charlottetown, moved, and Mr. A. A. McLean, Q. C., seconded, the nomination of William E. Dawson, Esquire.

A ballot having been taken, the result was announced as 102 votes for Mr. Stewart, and 36 votes for Mr. Dawson.

Mr. R. B. Norton then moved, seconded by Mr. James Paton, and supported by Mr. W. F. H. Carvell, that the nomination be made unanimous.

This motion passed unanimously.

WEST PRINCE.

MR. HACKETT was unanimously nominated at the Liberal Conservative Convention held yesterday. He has accepted the nomination and is now in the field. Success to the Liberal Conservatives of West Prince.

TARTE'S RETIREMENT.

The reported retirement of Mr. Tarte, at this juncture, is practically a confession of weakness and of guilt on the part of the government. Mr. Tarte has posed as Master of the Administration; and the Administration has done that which cannot be justified before the country. So Mr. Tarte will serve the purpose of a scapegoat. But he will not go into the wilderness! He will be placed by his sorrowful colleagues, who have also sinned, in a fine fat office in gay Paris. The members of the government dare not face the people with Tarte at their head, and they think that the people will excuse them when Tarte is away in France. They will find themselves mistaken. The people will, properly, hold them as fully responsible for all their extravagance and false promises, and corruption, as if Mr. Tarte were still directing their movements from his office in Ottawa.

MORE GRIT PARTIALITY.

The Grits in power are making bold efforts to turn everything to their own account. They are not above allowing politics to influence their actions wherever they thought it will advance their interests to do so. The partiality shown in the matter of the distribution of the Fenian raid medals is a case in point. It is pointed out in a late despatch that on the official list of medallists of the old St. John volunteer battalion, now 62nd Fusiliers, but two officers appear with rank, namely, Major M. W. Maher and Lieut.-Col. Blaine. The records show that neither Mahar, who was then lieutenant, nor Blaine, who was only a sergeant, went to the front with the battalion, having been granted leave to remain in St. John. Five officers now living did go, but not one of them is mentioned with rank in the list. It is, perhaps, needless to add that Major Maher, and Lieutenant-Col. Blaine are stalwart Liberals. The political leanings of those who have been ignored may be easily guessed.

AFTER FOUR YEARS.

The Montreal Gazette quotes the words of Hon. Edward Blake as aptly descriptive of the effects of Sir Wilfrid's four-year reign: It has left us with lowered standards of public virtue, and a death-like apathy in public opinion; with racial, religious, and provincial animosities rather inflamed than soothed; with a subservient parliament, an autocratic executive, debauched constituencies, and corrupted and corrupting classes.

THEN AND NOW.

SIR RICHARD CYRTEWRIGHT viewed with alarm the annual expenditure of \$38,000,000; in consonance with Mr. Blair's theory, he now looks upon the expenditure of \$56,000,000 with perfect equanimity.

The Liberal following—the McMullens, the Fraasers, the Caseys, the McMullans, the Landerkins, the Belcourts, the Maxwells, and the rest of the violent partisans—have one day shouted for economy and the next voted for extravagant expenditures; they have preached purity in one breath and then defended frauds in elections and jobs and deals in Governmental affairs; they have for years professed Free Trade and all at once lovingly embraced Protection; they have twisted and turned and eaten their own words and abandoned their prized principles submissively just when their leaders twisted and turned and ate their words and abandoned their principles, and they swallowed everything hook and line, bob and sinker, with chain lightning rapidity.—Star.
