Increased Number Of Exhibits At Souris

Increased entries in all classes were noted in the 1958 edition of the Eastern Kings County Exhibition held at Souris yesterday. His Honour Lieutenant Governor Hyndman accompanied by his aide, Lt. Commander Douglas Saunders made his first official visit to Souris to preside at the opening. Other speakers included Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Agriculture, John A. MacDonald, M.P. for Kings; Walter R. Shaw, P.C. Provincial leader; Monsignor J.A. Murphy, Brenton St. John, M.L.A. and William Acorn, M.B.A.

There was an excellent display of roots and vegetables. The Coffin twins Fred and Frank who are perennial winners in potato exhibits again took the top honours. A friendly gathering where good natured rivalry is carried on between neighbors. It is characterized by a homespun atmosphere free from the forms of commercialism which detract from the original purpose of rural fairs of this kind. As one of the speakers noted—with the interest shown, there is every reason to believe that the show will continue for many years to come.

CATTLE JUDGING

Thirteen firsts out of 16 classes was the remarkable showing of the herd from the Estate of Brent Slead of Bay Fortune. The late Mr. Slead who was vice-president of the Island Ayrshire Breeders' Association had during the last number of years built up a strong Ayrshire entry.

Since his death two months ago, his widow and his family have carried on. Yesterday a son and a daughter showed the cattle while Mrs. Slead gave supervision at the stables.

In addition to their long list of firsts the Stead herd captured the grand reserve championship male and the grand and reserve championship female. It was a crowning achievement and a great Ayrshire breeder.

Edwin Reid and Son of Rollo Bay took two firsts and N. W. MacLeod and Son of Bridgetown took one first. Taking their share of the prize money were Robert A. White, Rollo Bay; John and Robert Acorn, Dundas; Gerry Doyle, Summerville; Lloyd MacEwen, Rollo Bay.

GUERNEYS AND JERSEYS

Honours were evenly divided in the Guernsey and Jersey classes. Ernest Underhay of Bay Fortune and Cyrus Martin of Summerville. Each had won one of the first prizes in the 14 classes. However it was the Martin herd which took both grand and reserve honours in both the male and female section.

Other exhibitors who came in for a share of the prize money were Lloyd MacEwen, John S. MacDonald, Rollo Bay and Anne Rose, East Baltic.

HOLSTEINS

The Holsteins had the largest entry of the show. Charles S. MacDonald of Souris River took seven first prizes and had the male grand and reserve grand championship. Mr. MacDonald also had the best of three cattle.

The MacDonald herd had the distinction of having the best animal of all breeds at the Exhibition and for this received the Canadian Bank of Commerce Silver Rose Bowl.

BEEF BREEDS

There was a strong showing of Herefords and Judge Fulton Sanderson expressed the belief that the Herefords at the Souris Exhibition could give strong competition in any Island show.

Plumbing, Heating Contract Let Re Georgetown Wharf

OTTAWA — The Federal Department of Public Works has awarded a contract in the amount of \$19,672 to Douglas Bros. and Jones Ltd., of Charlottetown, P.E.I. for Railway Wharf Reconstruction (Plumbing and Heating) at Georgetown, P.E.I. Specified completion date for the project is approximately October 30, 1958.

The work under this contract will consist of the installation of a heating system in the shed, and a water system on the wharf, which is presently under reconstruction under a separate contract.

In the boiler house, which is to be erected under the contract for the reconstruction of the wharf, a high pressure steam generator of a capacity of 600,000 B.T.U.'s per hour is to be installed, and a stand-by motor generator of a capacity of 7 kilowatts.

Two 500-gallon fuel tanks and one 100-gallon fuel tank are also to be installed. Two projection and 8 horizontal heaters with all steam and return piping and fittings, will be installed in the shed, and cast-iron radiators in the offices, rest room and lavatory, where plumbing fixtures will also be installed.

Installation of a water system will be made in the Boiler House, including all pump and pressure tank, including all piping and fittings. The water system is to be extended to the shed to supply four fire-fighting outlets, and to the wharf to supply five outlets for feeding ships.

Plans and specifications were prepared by the Charlottetown District Office of the Harbours and Rivers Engineering Branch of the Federal Department of Public Works.

RELIGION AND LIFE

RANGE OF TRUTHS MUST COVER WHOLE

Some years ago a Toronto journalist visited the churches of the city and wrote his impressions of their worship and their message. In the main, his comments were discerning and fair, but on one of the greater churches he was severe.

He summed up a biting criticism with a remark something like this: "If I want to be certain about my faith, I want to go to a church where the message is as clear as the light of day, and where the message is as simple as the life of Christ."

How would a visitor seeking in desperation for an answer to that question, fare in the churches of today? And, to be quite personal, how would a reader on the same quest, fare in this column?

The obvious answer is:—A preacher can't always be preaching on conversion. The wide range of Bible truth and of human need is before him, and he cannot be "true to his trust" to the seeking soul.

At the same time, the entrance to the Christian way of life is of primary importance. I think it was Dr. T. L. Cuyler, of Brooklyn, who said that even when he did not preach directly on that subject, he always tried, either by an "aside" or by a pointed appeal, to echo Christ's call to the sinner.

AND THY HOUSE When the Philippian jailer, under the stress of a sudden conviction, burst in on St. Paul with the question: "What must I do to be saved?", the Apostle replied: "Believe on the Lord Jesus and thou shalt be saved, and thy house."

Then, when in Ephesians 2: 8-10 the Apostle analyzed that answer, he wrote the finest explanation to be found anywhere: "For by grace have ye been saved by faith; and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God; not of works, that no man should glory. For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works which God before prepared that we should walk in them" (Ephesians 2: 8-10).

Which is to say — we are saved, not by good works but in order to do good works. You cannot save yourself by any effort a human being can make. You must accept salvation as a gift — a free gift of God.

St. Paul's Gospel is true for all men for all time: the question is, the faith that saves is How can it become effective in my particular case? A lifetime's experience would lead one to put the emphasis on the second phrase in the statement just quoted — "and that not of ourselves" — that is, even that faith that receives salvation is God's gift. He enables me to accept for myself the salvation which He has provided for all the world.

AS A STUDENT When a young student in my first mission field, I was called to visit a sufferer whose disease seemed likely to be fatal. He was an old pioneer who had lived through the hardships and struggles of early life in northern Ontario, and had measured his strength against the severities of its climate and the difficulties which had challenged the settlers. Now death was just ahead, and frankly and fearlessly he faced it.

When I tried to explain to him the Gospel offer as I understood it, his answer was: "It seems too simple. If there was anything I could do at all equal to the re-
