## Trading Stamps Opposed By RMA

The Retail Merchants' Association of Prince Edward Island intends to take stringent measures regarding the use of trading stamps or tape premiums. At a meeting of the directors held at the Queen Hotel Wednesday William Ellis presided. Directors present were: Frank Jenkins, Summerside; Athol Cotton, Kensington; James Burtleigh, Elfrerslie; Bill Calbeck, Bedouque; Joseph Zakem, Charlottetown; and Bill MacEwen, New London.

The RMA went on record as "irrevocably opposing" a stamp or tape premium promotion plan in the province. They hold that "good business ethics are essential to continued good relations between retailer and customer and that merchants or companies using stamps or other similar plans are making use of loopholes in the law and are not doing themselves or their profession a service."

The directors expressed the opinion that all owners or managers of firms in Prince Edward Island have the responsibility of "housecleaning" their own business operation and "should operate their business totally within the law without taking part in any scheme or promotion which is of doubtful value to the community at large."

The Retail Merchants' Association of Prince Edward Island stated that "future contraventions of the lotteries act will not go unheeded."

The organization has set up a committee for the consideration and organization of a hardware wholesale-retail group. The purpose of this group will be to coordinate work between the wholesale houses and retail merchants.

**LOBSTER CATCH DOWN**  
GRAND MANAN, N.B. (CP)—Lobster fishermen in the richest of New Brunswick lobster waters off this southern New Brunswick island estimate the catch to date is 25 per cent below that of last year. Exceptionally cold water temperatures last winter inhibiting propagation is given as the reason. Lobsters are fetching 45 cents a pound, down slightly from last year. The season opened Nov. 9.
