POLITICAL LEAKS WORRY OFFICIALS

JOHANNESBURG, June 20 (CP)—Members of the South African Union government are becoming increasingly perturbed at the extent to which confidential information is finding its way to the camps of their political opposition, the "Purified Nationalist" party.

It was and means by which perpetual leakages might, in future, be prevented, have been receiving serious consideration of departmental heads in consultation with responsible members of the ministry.

It was recently declared that the organization responsible for these leakages is a secret one, comprising a large number of young public servants and university students.

The secret society operates along Nazi lines, using as a model the Hitler Youth Movement, and is basically anti-British, anti-Imperial, and anti-Jewish. Members glorify Nazi methods and discuss "der Tag" when a South African Republic, free from British or "Jingo" influences, will be established.

Mirror Of The Nation
 By "Commoner"

Ottawa, June 20.

Coming events cast their shadows before. So, Liberal members of the House of Commons, before leaving Ottawa at the close of the recess, cleared their rooms and desks of all personal correspondence, and effected a general clearing of their desks. They did this because they are convinced they are facing a general election and that scores of them will not be returning to Ottawa for any future sessions. They did not want to have the expense and trouble of a trip to Ottawa, after their defeat, to leave their parliamentary premises in order.

It is significant that only one Conservative member cleaned out his desk before leaving. He is not accepting re-nomination. All the other Conservative members are confident of being back for the first session of the new parliament and they merely turned the keys in their desks.

The time honored expression "he is licked before he starts" at the polls will not be used in reference to the Liberal party. The defeatist spirit of a large body of Liberal members is a closer matter as it is recognized by the majority of Liberal party organizers. A number of them will not accept re-nomination because they do not feel like spending time on a cause they know in advance to be lost. Several are seeking to be appointed to government jobs while the ministry hangs in the air.

Virtually all of them look through the glass darkly at the prospects of the coming election.

The Liberal band of 28 Conservatives who fought so tirelessly for action on public questions throughout the session, left Ottawa in quite the opposite spirit. They are confident they will return a host to the new parliament.

If confidence is half the battle, the impending struggle at the polls will not lack a certain resemblance to a horse race as Sir John A. MacDonald was credited with saying of the battle of the ballots with their banners flying.

BREAK UP FLEETS OF GERMAN SHIPS

BERLIN, June 19 (CP)—Dispersal of the fleet of ships of the Jewish Arnold Bernstein, who is believed to have taken place according to Hamburg reports.

The "Pennland" and the "West-ernland" of 10,000 tons each, are to be sold to a Belgian shipping company, while the remaining seven vessels, totalling 36,000 tons, are expected to remain in Germany and may be scrapped.

Arnold Bernstein, Jewish owner, was sentenced early last year to a two-year, six-months penal servitude under the new constitution (\$410,000) on a charge of having violated currency regulations.

MALTA ELECTS FOR NEW DEAL

MALTA, June 20 (CP)—Polling for Malta's council of government first under the new constitution proclaimed in February, will take place July 22 and 23. Results will be available two or three days later.

The council has been designed to represent the people through elected representatives, in association with the government.

It will consist of eight official members, two unofficial members nominated by the governor, and 10 elected members. The governor will preside over its deliberations, and will have, if necessary, a casting vote.

MONTRÉUX, June 19 (CP)—Henry B. Gagnon, Swiss botanist, with a world-wide reputation for cultivation of Alpine plants, shrubs and rock gardens, is dead at 85.
