Paul's Flying Service this week-end celebrate their fourth anniversary. This post war flying business, managed by Mr. E. Paul Sharp, a veteran pilot of over three-quarters of a million miles flying, is probably most noted for the many mercy flights carried out during the past few winters when dozens of dangerously ill patients have been flown to the Island's hospitals. In addition, more than five thousand passengers have been carried on local sight-seeing flights and a total of thirty-two pilots have gained their licenses from the Flying School.
