## Ex-Premier's Son Passes Suddenly

Stephen James MacMillan, long-time resident of Charlottetown, died suddenly Monday evening in the Charlottetown Hospital after a lengthy illness. He was 59 years of age.

Mr. MacMillan was the son of the late Hon. W.J.P. MacMillan, former premier of Prince Edward Island and Mrs. MacMillan.

Mr. MacMillan was educated at Queen Square School, Union Commercial College and St. Dunstan's University before serving overseas with the Royal Canadian Airforce from 1940-1945.

Surviving are his wife, the former Mary Cummings of Ver-

non River, a son William of Charlottetown and his stepmother, Mrs. W.J.P. MacMillan, Charlottetown.

Also surviving are daughters Geneva, Mrs. Albert Peddle of Montreal; Mary Lee, Mrs. Stephen Bezanon, Greenwood, N.S.; and Geraldine, Mrs. Kenneth Smith of Charlottetown.

Other survivors include two sisters, Mrs. Alban Farmer of Charlottetown and Mrs. G. E. Bohan, California. A third sister, Mrs. Sinclair Trainor predeceased him.

Two surviving brothers are Joseph R., of Halifax and Dr. Allan MacMillan, Charlottetown.

## Microwave Network Is Near Completion

MONCTON, — Prince Edward Island, which made communications history 115 years ago when it was linked to the Mainland with the first submarine telegraph cable ever laid in North America, is now being provided with services to meet the needs of the computer age.

Canadian National Telecommunications technicians are completing an extension of CNT's microwave network to P.E.I. Microwaves can carry such diverse signals as telephone, television, telex, telegraph, teletype and computer data, and the new link will improve and increase CNT's services to the provinces businesses and industries.

The relay sight at Egmont, is nearing completion while the terminals at Moncton and Summerside are ready. The new service will be in operation by the end of this month and, to increase capacity within the province, wire lines between Summerside and Charlottetown will be improved and additional voice and telegraph carrier installed.

William Bellamy, superintendent of CNT's Maritime district, says "The extended service will give direct connection to microwave systems in Canada and the United States. It's another step in our efforts to provide more reliable service to our customers."

"At the same time, the services facilities can be easily expanded to meet future needs," commented Mr. Bellamy. "The
