

The British Revenue.

Touching the money market, the London Globe of the 4th inst., says: "Never were known such stupendous figures as were yesterday published for the revenue of the United Kingdom for the year ending March 31st. Fancy their equalling £88,043,110 stg., as the gross amount of the receipts from all sources of income up to that date. And what is more, they exhibited an increase of £837,926 over the expended total for the corresponding period of 1883-84, despite the badness of trade, and a most trying period of political and financial complications. For the past quarter the revenue reached no less than £29,371,714 against £26,838,487 in the same time last year, which is another most encouraging feature, and gives rise to the hope that the propositions in the forthcoming budget may possibly not be so unpalatable or difficult to swallow as has been generally supposed.

The Pope's Recovery.

STILL SUFFERING FROM MENTAL WORRY - CREGLIA'S NOMINATION.

The New York Herald's correspondent in Rome telegraphs that His Holiness, Pope Leo, who had been indisposed for some days past, is now almost well again, though suffering from mental worry and anxiety from various causes which have excited him lately, notably the French reverses in Tonquin, which endanger Catholic missions in China, political troubles in Belgium and Spain, delay in negotiations with Germany, Russian persecution of Catholics, and last, but not least, the aggressive speech of Sig. Depretis at the inauguration of the Victor Emmanuel monument. There was some talk at the Vatican of replying to the Italian premier's utterances by the dispatch of a new letter of protestation to the great powers. The periodic rumor of the Pope's intention to leave Rome is again current. The marked favor shown the Ultramontane Cardinal Oreglia by the holy father is interpreted rather hastily, as proof that this time the report is worthy of credence. This much is true: Leo XIII. has counselled Cardinal Oreglia to present a proposal to the Camerlingo to arrange the meeting of the next conclave outside of Italy, should the Italians attempt the slightest interference with its labors. Oreglia's nomination is very disagreeable to the Quirinal.

The United States Indians.

Riel has wisely timed his outbreak. The snow is melting. Soon the frozen morasses will be quagmire, and the swollen rivers impracticable to ford. The season is in his favor. The nativity of the settlers favors his success. Let any man go down to Castle Garden and carefully study the sluggish movements of the Scotch, English and Swedish immigrants, and then remembering that these immigrants are not used to arms bearing, not used to border warfare, and that they are encumbered with women and children, ask himself what chance they have in a fight with skilled horsemen, who are deadly shots, and used to war from their babyhood, and who can, and have in the case of the Sioux and Cheyennes, whipped the United States cavalry man for man.

The pretence made by some of our West Point warriors that our army will guard the lines between the Northwest Territory and the United States, and prevent our Indians from joining forces with the braves under Riel, is absolutely ludicrous to men who know the country. Stop the American Indians from crossing the line if they are so disposed, will they? The chase the Christian warrior O. O. Howard had after Chief Joseph is still fresh in the memory of the people. The raid of the northern Cheyennes from the Indian Territory to Wyoming has not been forgotten, nor has the fact that they whipped all the United States troops, all the cow-boys and all the settlers that were brought before them. Wild Hog, the Cheyenne chief, personally told me that he did not consider the fighting earnest fighting at all. Sitting Bull led his Sioux across the line in the face of a large portion of the United States army, and he had previously annihilated Custer's command. It is highly absurd for our officers to gravely announce that they will not permit American Indians to cross the line. It has yet to be discovered that they want to cross. If they do, the discourteous creatures will not ask our army officers for permission to go. They will simply saddle their horses and go, and there will not be a soldier within 20 miles of the point where they cross. - F. Wilkeson in N. Y., San.

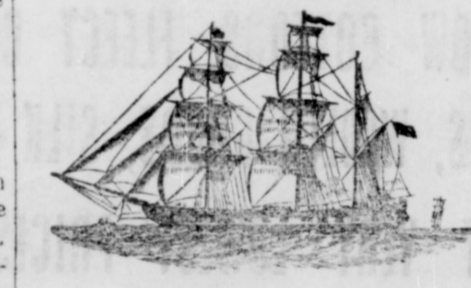
