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S'ide Mayor Expresses His Pride In Canadian Traditions

Mayor W.A. Currie at the regular meeting of the Summerside Town Council last evening expressed the pride and emotion felt by Canadians who viewed the democratic traditions which surrounded the opening of Parliament by Queen Elizabeth.

Mayor Currie said he was sure that all who were fortunate enough to hear the broadcast of the opening of the Federal Parliament by the Queen and had the opportunity of viewing the moving spectacle are just a little more proud than ever that they are Canadians and that the traditions of democratic government handed down by the mother parliament of Great Britain are still practiced in Canada. It brought home the value of these traditions and the dignity of the parliamentary system.

"We in this council," he said, "while forming a lower level of government, never-the-less are even closer to the people and should be justly proud of our offices and display the same dignity in the conduct of meetings and the carrying out of council duties."

Councillor Hillard Clark, chairman of the Electric Light Department, concluded his report by suggesting more detailed information should be made public on civic matters which often demand considerable time and study. He said he had recently been questioned by a citizen on some of these matters, and illustrated the point by referring to the reasons that had led the council to the decisions they had taken in regard to such things as the auditorium curtains, the traxevator, and the billing machine.

Councillor Clark said he felt that recognitions should also be noted by the Council in regard to the Town, its organizations, and its citizens, and expressed disappointment that a recent athletic achievement by Summerside students reported recently in the Guardian had not, he said, stressed the Summerside successes in regard to the

Wide Variety Of Accidents In Maritimes Over Weekend

NEW GLASGOW (CP)—Henry Miller, 22 of Merigomish, N.S., was fatally injured Saturday night when his car left the highway and rolled over several times at nearby Egerton.

DARTMOUTH, N.S. (CP)—Albert R. King, 50, died Sunday night when his car swerved into a telephone pole in adjacent Westphal.

TRACADIE, N.B. (CP)—Dorothy Robertson of Tabusintac, a registered nurse, died in hospital

here early Sunday a few hours after she was hurled from a car which went out of control at Riviere des Caches. Faye Harding and Herman Macintosh were seriously injured. A group of five had been returning from a dance.

EDMUNDSTON, N.B. (CP)—Nobert Bosse, 39, was killed Sunday when a car driven by his brother, Roland struck a telephone pole 10 miles northwest of Edmundston on highway No. 2. The driver escaped with a minor injury and another occupant,

Kacou LeBrun, 22, was reported in fair condition in hospital here.

SACKVILLE, N.B. (CP)—Two middle-aged residents of the Sackville area met death by shooting Saturday. They were Humbert Sherwood, a farmer at Jolicure, and Gregory Francis King, registrar of motor vehicles at Sackville.

Reports indicated Sherwood died shortly after being hit by a stray revolver shot during target practice at his nearby hunting camp at the time. Later King's body was found in a barn some miles away. A shotgun lay beside the body. The revolver was found at the scene of Sherwood's death.

An inquest was decided un-

necessary in both cases.

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—Arthur Gallant, 27, was killed Sunday while walking home from work when a car swerved into him after colliding with another car on Chesley Street.

EDMUNDSTON, N.B. (CP)—Three-year-old Roland Pelletier died in hospital here Sunday as a result of injuries suffered Friday when he was struck by a car. The accident occurred in front of his home between Caron Brook and Baker Lake.
