Robert S. P. Jardine Dies Unexpectedly

Robert S.P. Jardine, well known Charlottetown citizen, retired bank manager, and veteran of World War One, died unexpectedly in the city yesterday afternoon. He was 75. He had attended service at the Kirk of St. James in the morning.

Mr. Jardine was born in Free-town, P.E.I., the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. David Jardine. As a young man he joined the Bank of Commerce now known as the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce.

Following the end of the war, Mr. Jardine rejoined the bank and served in various branches. He returned to Summerside in 1930 as manager of the branch here. In 1940 he was appointed manager of the branch at Charlottetown. He retired in 1950.

On his retirement, Mr. Jardine organized the Jardine Adjusting Agency Ltd. now managed by his son David.

Mr. Jardine was an Elder in the Kirk of St. James and treasurer of the Session. Keenly interested in youth, he lent active support to the Boy Scout movement for many years.

An ardent sportsman, he was particularly interested in fishing and curling. He was a member of the Charlottetown Club.

Mr. Jardine leaves to mourn his wife, the former Margaret Ratchford of Amherst, N.S., three sons, Robert in Montreal,

N.S., David in Sherwood, and one daughter, Margaret at home.

The funeral will be held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Kirk of St. James. Interment will be in Sherwood Cemetery.

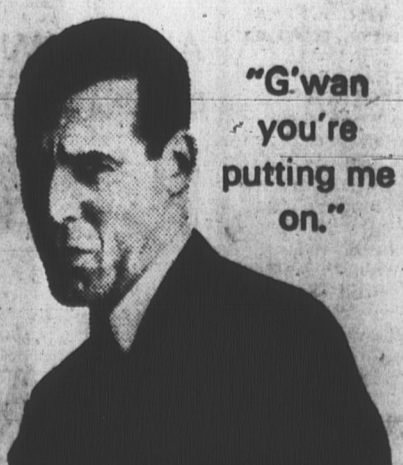

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says Sunday was the third consecutive day with record breaking cold temperatures in the Maritimes. Halifax, Greenwood, Yarmouth, Truro, Sydney, Summerside and Fredericton experienced such frigid daytime and night time temperatures that existing records for the date were either broken or tied.

The unusual situation of mild air far to the north and cold air over the Maritimes has led to the development of a large area of cloud and intermittent snow over much of Quebec and Labrador. This weather is now expected to drift slowly southward. Cloud will spread slowly across the district today. Followed later by snowflurries or intermittent snow. Not much relief from the low temperatures of the past few days can be expected today.

Regional forecasts: Prince Edward Island, Eastern New Brunswick Counties, Lower St. John River Valley, Bay of Chaleur: Clouding over. Intermittent light snow continuing extremely cold. Light winds increasing in the morning to westerly 15; low-high at Charlottetown 12 below 5 above, Moncton 12 below 8 above, Fredericton 12 below 5 above, Moncton 12 below 8 above, Fredericton 12 below 8 above, Saint John 15 below 10 above, Campbellton 18 below zero.
