### Sherwood Hospital Opening Declared New Step Forward

Dr. M. N. Beck presided over ceremonies marking the official opening of Sherwood Hospital for retarded children yesterday afternoon.

Highlighting the ceremonies were the cutting of the ribbon by Lieutenant-Governor F. W. Hyslop, who declared the building officially opened, and the playing of the choruses by Premier Walter R. Shaw.

Bert Schmickel, deputy commissioner of the Connecticut health department, was guest speaker for the occasion.

In his introductory remarks, Dr. Beck stressed the need for community support in the field of retardation. "We must avoid the pitfall of allowing this hospital to become isolated from the community," he said. He also stated that in most instances retarded children should remain in the home, where they could be helped by "home strengthening" services provided by the social worker.

Dr. Beck followed his remarks by an introduction of the hospital staff. Representatives of mental health associations in

several other provinces also spoke to congratulate this province on its achievement.

Hon. Hubert MacNeill, M.D., minister of health, also addressed the crowd assembled to witness the opening. He read congratulatory telegrams and letters from officials in other provinces who were unable to be present.

Prior to the ribbon-cutting ceremony, guest speaker Bert Schmickel spoke on the advances which had been made in helping the mentally retarded. "Until recently," he said, "non-professional people spearheaded the resurgence of interest in retardation."

Mr. Schmickel also stressed the importance of having small regional centres in urban areas to care for the mentally retarded. He paid tribute to the work done by Dr. Beck and his associates, and stated that the people of this province had, with the establishing of Sherwood hospital, "stolen the march" on Connecticut in the field of aid for mental retardation.

### Two Fishermen Fined On Lobster Charges

ALBERTON — Victor Roy Rappert, Kings Central, was fined \$75 and costs or 60 days by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonnell yesterday for possession of 419 undersized lobsters. Fishery Officer Thane Douglas told of following a truck at 70 miles an hour on the back of which two youths were throwing out sacks of lobsters.

Edward Fines, Tignish, pleaded guilty to possession of 209 undersized lobsters and received a fine of \$75 and costs or 50 days.

Jerry Buote, Tignish, was

found guilty of possession of 273 undersized lobsters on June 30. Judgment in the case and two other charges of possession of large quantities of short lobsters, was adjourned to Aug. 1.

Joseph Carl Powers, Alberton South, was fined \$10 and costs for driving without a license and Wendell Frederick Harper, Tignish, was given a similar fine for driving without due care and attention.

Another man was fined \$25 and costs for possession of lobster in a place other than his residence.

For causing a disturbance in a public place, Paul Handravan, Tignish, was fined \$25 and costs or 15 days and Clayton Callaghan, St. Louis received a fine of \$10 and costs for insufficient equipment on a motor vehicle.
