ST. DUNSTAN'S CATHEDRAL.—The service of the Forty Hours Devotion closed this morning, the Mass of Reposition being celebrated at nine o'clock. Rev. Dr. Doyle, of Vernon River, was the celebrant, assisted by Rev. Stephen Phelan, of Georgetown, as deacon, and Rev. J. J. Johnston, of the Cathedral staff, as sub-deacon. Rev. I. R. A. Macdonald directed the ceremonies. During the services His Lordship Bishop Macdonald and the staff of the Cathedral had the assistance of a number of clergymen from other parts of the diocese. About 3,500 persons approached the Holy Table during the services.

A WORD WITH THE POLICE.

SIR,—I wish to know how far the police of this city are justified in beating, clubbing and otherwise inhumanly treating an intoxicated person whom they are trying to arrest. Is the law drawn anywhere, and if so, where? Has a drunken man no rights whatever, and is he to be upon and have his features so battered, beaten and bruised by these officers, that his most intimate friends would not know him? There are pertinent questions which many of the citizens of Charlottetown would like to have answered.

Exhibit one of brutality in cases of arrest are of such frequent occurrence that the people of this city have ceased to be shocked by them; but occasionally these guardians of our laws perpetrate an act of such unwarranted cruelty that people are compelled to stop and think; and ask themselves the question where is it going to end? Are these persons whom we pay to guard the welfare of the city be allowed to commit more crimes than they suppress? There are several cases fresh in the minds of the people to which I will allude one is the case of a man named Clark who was taken to the Hospital and from thence to the burying ground. Another is the case of the breaking of the plate glass window in the McLeod building for which the city is likely to have to pay. On Sunday last a young lad who was intoxicated was attacked by two policemen and thrown down on the hard frozen ground where they proceeded to amuse themselves by blacking his eyes, smashing his mouth and tearing the skin of his face, and finally when they had the life nearly knocked out of him they handcuffed him and locked him up. Our present police force are just as useless and just as great a nuisance as our corner loafers, with this in favor of the corner loafers that we don't have to pay them a salary. It is time we made a clean sweep of them and placed competent men in their places
