Skin-Graft For Smallwood's Son

TORONTO (CP) — Ramsay Smallwood, son of Premier Smallwood of Newfoundland, has entered Toronto General Hospital under the care of one of the country's leading plastic surgeons following a helicopter crash two weeks ago.

Mr. Smallwood's wife was killed in the crash and he suffered severe burns to the back, scalp, face and hands.

Dr. A. W. Farmer, surgeon in chief of the Hospital for Sick Children here, said Wednesday Mr. Smallwood's condition is good and he has been able to get out of bed to walk around.

He will undergo extensive skin-grafting, probably within the next 10 days. The extent and nature of these graftings will depend on how well the burned areas have healed.
