## 'Air of Optimism' Around Chicago Black Hawk's Camp

PEMBROKE, Ont., (CP)—There is an air of optimism around the training camp of Chicago Black Hawks of the National Hockey League.

The Hawks finished in the cellar last year. Now they have a new coach and some new players.

Coach Frank Eddolls puts it this way: "We have to improve—there is no other way to go."

He succeeded Sid Abel after coaching Buffalo Bisons of the American Hockey League and is entrusting on a couple of newcomers to give the team a lift.

**TOP AHL SCORER**

They are George Red Sullivan, former Boston Bruin farm hand who led AHL scorers last year with Hershey Bears, and Bobby Haysard, former Toronto Maple Leaf forward.

Haysard has been sizzling the ice at centre and left wing and may wind up on a line including Johnny McCormack who came to the Hawks from Montreal Canadiens in the NHL draft.

Last season the Hawks won only 12 games and tied seven in 70 starts. That left them at the bottom of the NHL standings, 34 points below the next-to-last New York Rangers.

"We have to do something about the 242 goals which were poured behind goalie Al Rollins last season," Eddolls said. "I figure we will fare all right if we slice the total by 60, because the boys are strong enough offensively."

## Report Prince Charles To Take Boxing Lessons

LONDON, (Reuters)—Five-year-old Prince Charles will take boxing lessons during his new school term, and a little American boy has been picked as one probable sparring partner, court circles said Monday.

They identified the American youngster as six-year-old Stephen Ritter, whose father is a political officer at the American embassy here.

A spokesman at Buckingham Palace said Prince Charles has not yet met Stephen.

Palace etiquette forbids the Ritters from explaining how or why their son was one of two chosen—the other lad is British—to land some practice blows on the chin of the future king of England.

Stephen began his boxing lessons last year.

Charles, who will be six next month, gives every promise of becoming as keen a sportsman as his father, the Duke of Edinburgh.

**EXTRAS ARE BURDEN**

Scholastically, Charles is not required to master more than other boys his age. He is learning to read and write, and to express himself artistically with crayons.

What adds to his burden of education, however, are the extra-dancing lessons which he does not mind; riding lessons which he would gladly sacrifice; swimming lessons from his energetic father (which he thoroughly enjoys); and now the boxing lessons.

Like the Duke of Edinburgh, Charles enjoys anything mechanical. He has been having a wonderful, rowdy time tearing around the Balmoral grounds in his toy car. In his nursery is a small truck with mechanical arms which gather up toys from wherever they are scattered.

More and more he is stepping into a man's world, leaving his four-year-old sister, Anne, behind to play with her dolls and ride her pony.

## Seek Cockell For Canadian Bout

QUEBEC (CP)—The Canadian Boxing Federation announced Monday it is trying to arrange a heavyweight fight between British champion Don Cockell and the winner of the Earl Walls-James Parker bout in Toronto, Oct. 25.

Gene Letourneau, national commissioner of the CBF, said he has written the British boxing board of control to ask them to force Cockell to take on the bout. He said Harry Levine, Walls' agent in London, is interested in staging the fight at Royal Albert Hall.

Walls, the Canadian champion, defeated 250-pound Edgardo Romero of Argentina in a bout at Edmonton last Friday. Parker, a native of Berrie, Ont., now fights out of Paterson, N.J., but will return to Toronto for the Oct. 25 bout.

## Indians Have Trades In Mind

CLEVELAND (AP)—General manager Hank Greenberg of the Cleveland Indians discussed the club's shocking world series loss with his manager Monday, and served notice to the public that "we don't intend to stand pat."

"We have some trades in mind," said Greenberg. "I don't know if we can make them, but we'll try."

Greenberg declined to say what moves he had in mind, and manager Al Lopez later told reporters no immediate changes were planned.

He indicated he has no present plans for breaking up his big three pitching staff of Bob Lemon, Early Wynn and Mike Garcia.

## Name Team For Golf Series In Australia

CHICAGO (AP)—Ed Furgol, Marty Furgol, Dutch Harrison and Tommy Bolt were named Monday as United States team members for a month long series of golf matches in Australia.

The matches, sponsored by the PGA and a petroleum company, open Oct. 13.

Ed Furgol automatically made the team as national Open champion and the others were named off their Ryder Cup standings.

The Ryder Cup leaders include, in order: Bob Toski, Bolt, Cary Middlecoff, Marty Furgol, Jerry Barber, Lloyd Mangrum, Dutch Harrison, Ted Kroll, Ed Furgol and Jack Burke.

The PGA said Toski, Middlecoff, Barber and Mangrum declined the trip and the others moved into their places to complete the team.

Final money-winning totals for the season show that Toski won more than twice as much as his nearest rival. He took in \$65,891, mainly because of his \$50,000 victory in the Tam O'Shanter "world championship" two months ago.

Burke was second with \$20,213, only \$304 ahead of Marty Furgol who jumped from 14th place to third with a \$7,500 victory in the recent celebrities tourney.

Costello stands six feet three inches and weighs 190. In 26 games with Hershey in the American League last season he scored seven goals and had 13 assists. In 11 playoff games his totals were four goals and four assists.

## Saint John May Have Team In Atlantic Coast League

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—The local hockey situation brightened somewhat Monday night as reports indicated a group of sportsmen was interested in forming a Saint John team in the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League.

With one eye on the indefinite forum situation and another on the league's fast-closing door of entry, the group does not want to be publicly identified unless it can come forth with an announcement that would place the city back in the hockey wars.

A spokesman said this group was willing to back a hockey team if it was sure the forum would operate and an acceptable agreement could be made for use of the north end arena. He said the group had not been given definite assurance the rink would have ice this winter.

A forum official, Murray W. Long, said rink directors were still willing to talk business with responsible people who would be in

a position to finance the start and continued operation of a hockey team.

**TIME GROWS SHORT**

Time, however, is running out for both sides, and if application is not made for entry to the league by this week-end the city almost surely will be without senior hockey this winter.

The league executive will meet Sunday to begin work on a schedule.

Several of last year's Beavers, now resident in the city, are considering offers from other teams. Nick Nicolle reportedly has received offers from Grand Falls, Nfld., Amherst and Fredericton.

"Crow" Hewey, prolific right-winger, is said to be toying with offers from Atlantic coast league teams. A member of Halifax Atlantic in the Maritime Major League for the last two seasons, Doug McPhee is still in Saint John but has had more than one chance to tie up with outside senior clubs.

## Johnny Saxton Headed For Jail

NEW YORK, (AP)—No matter whether Johnny Saxton wins or loses his title fight with welterweight champion Kid Gavilan in Philadelphia, Oct. 20, he will have to go to jail the next day for traffic violations.

Chief magistrate John M. Murtagh made the decision Monday after the 24-year-old Brooklyn Negro had pleaded guilty to all charges in traffic court. Saxton had ignored a dozen tickets and bench warrant had been issued for his arrest.

Murtagh imposed a 15-day jail term and fined Saxton \$600, with the alternative of 60 more days in jail. He paid the fines.

Saxton's lawyer appealed for and was granted a stay of execution of the jail term so Saxton could go through with the fight.

## Leafs-Black Hawks In Trade

TORONTO (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League Monday night traded left-winger Ray Timgren to Chicago Black Hawks for defenceman Jack Price.

It was the latest of several player deals the Hawks have made in their move to get out of the league cellar.

Hap Day, assistant general manager of the Leafs, announced the switch. Timgren has been with the farm club Pittsburgh Hornets of the American League for the last two seasons.

Timgren, 26-year-old native of Windsor, Ont., has never been able to stick in the big time as a Leaf. Price a 22-year-old defenceman who was used occasionally on the forward line by the Hawks last season, will go to the Hornets, Day said.

## Hugh Campbell Signs As Coach Of Islanders

Hughie Campbell, who says that he will bring a bang-up team to the Island this season, was officially signed as coach of the 1954-55 Islanders at Moncton Sunday evening. Campbell is expected to arrive in town a week from today and will sit in on a meeting of the club the night he arrives.

EDMONTON (CP)—Edmonton Flyers of the Western Hockey League announced Monday the signing of left-winger Ray Hannigan. Flyers had suspended the South Porcupine, Ont., product Saturday for refusing to come to terms.

## Western Hockey League Opens Schedule Tonight

EDMONTON (CP)—The Western Hockey League, now nine years old and getting more solid every year, opens its 70-game 1954-55 schedule tonight with games at Edmonton and Vancouver.

The six teams are Calgary Stampede, last year's champion; Saskatoon Quakers, Edmonton Flyers, Victoria Cougars, New Westminster Royals and Vancouver Canucks.

Seattle Bombers, who had attendance trouble last season, are not operating in 1954-55 but their franchise is being held in abeyance. Regina already has been accepted for the 1955-56 season.

Winnipeg, with a new arena, is a strong candidate for a berth in 1955-56 and Portland, erecting an 8,000-seat building, may be back in 1956-57.

## Toronto Carpenters Quit, Then Return

TORONTO, (CP)—Toronto carpenters, who walked off their jobs Monday and held a mass meeting to discuss strike strategy, later voted to return to work.

The 3,500-member Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners (B.C.J.) union voted "overwhelmingly" to accept a five-cent-an-hour wage increase offered by Toronto contractors. The union had previously voted to strike for an eight-cent increase recommended by a conciliation board.

The increase will be retroactive to May 1.

The new rate for carpenters is \$2.25 an hour. Toronto's 1,200 bricklayers receive \$2.35 an hour.
