A WORTHY MOVE.—It is pleasing to hear that Mr. Benjamin Heertz has decided to erect a new "Heertz's Hall," near the site of the present building. The structure, on which active work has already commenced, will be four feet long and twenty-four wide, with ten feet high post. On Sunday, June 30th, the hall will be opened, when Dr. W. H. Heertz, of Toronto, is to be present to conduct the service. When completed, the new building will cost about \$1000. The entire expenses will be defrayed by Messrs. Richard and Benjamin Heertz.

Messrs. J. Brenton Dawson, Geo. J. Rogers, and Louis G. Wear accompanied the band and generously treated the inmates to tobacco and candy. The members of the band and the gentlemen who accompanied them are deserving of the highest praise for the part they took towards enabling the most helpless of God's creatures to pass a pleasant evening.

BLACK DIAMOND LINE.—On the opening of navigation the steamers of the Black Diamond Line will begin their regular service between the ports of Montreal, Charlottetown, North Sydney, and St. John's. The steamers of this line are all well and favorably known and no further reference need be made to them here. Ample shed room will be provided for the accommodation of shippers and free storage will be given at freight, consigned to the Peake Bros. & Co. at Charlottetown and they will be at all times pleased to afford the fullest information respecting the steamers.

AN IOWA LIQUOR LAW.—The Supreme Court has sustained the constitutionality of the Iowa statute for the regulation of the liquor traffic, familiarly known as the "mule" law. The mule law was passed by the last legislature as a compromise measure between license and prohibition. Under its provisions prohibition remains the general law of the state, but upon a petition of a majority of voters of cities of over 5,000 population and 65 per cent. of the voters of the counties having no cities of that size, the city council and township authorities may inflict a mule tax of \$400 and upwards per annum upon the places where liquor is sold. The payment of this tax shall be a bar to prosecutions under the prohibitory law.

A LIQUOR SELLING SCHEME.—The Campbellton, N. B., enterprise describes the scheme of Lawrence J. Lapointe, of Nasik's Creek, to evade the liquor license law. Lapointe's plan consisted of the issue of tickets, marked ten, twenty-five and seventy-five cents each. He offered these tickets for sale on the understanding that he who purchased a ten-cent ticket would on presenting the same receive a ticket without paying for it, as the money had been previously given for the ticket. The holder of a twenty-five cent ticket would be entitled to a small flask, and the holder of a seventy-five cent ticket would be entitled to a "square face." The inspector brought Mr. Lapointe before a magistrate and he was fined \$50 and costs for selling liquor without license.

THE STANLEY ARRIVED AT GEORGETOWN about half past eleven o'clock to-day, and will leave on return to Pictou to-morrow morning.

NO WORK FOR CORONERS.—Dr. Finn has been appointed to the position of medical examiner. Hereafter all sudden deaths must be reported to him, who alone is to judge whether or not the facts of the case warrant the holding of an inquest. Should he decide that an inquest is necessary, the same is to be held by the stipendiary magistrate. In cases where there is reason to believe that the deceased met with foul play, the stipendiary will summon a jury. The medical examiner's fee will be \$4, and in cases where an autopsy is necessary, \$12. This virtually does away with coroners so far as Halifax, city and Dartmouth is concerned. The act does not apply to any other part of the county.—Halifax Herald.
